-With fire and sword the Americans are giving the Filipinos lessons in civilized conquest. They are doing this however at a far more serious loss to themselves than ever Spain cost them. America is simply doing what she went to war with Spain for doing, and were it not that her strength is likely to make a better job of it no justification could be found for the determined effort to suppress every Filipino aspiration for independence.

-A very delicate situation exists in the Samoan Islands. Britain, United States and Germany have each for some years taken a fatherly solicitude in their welfare, which may or may not be quite disinterested. Two rival native claimants for the throne divide the allegiance of the Islanders. One of these has the sympathy of Germany, the other has that of the two Anglo-Saxon nations. Last week counter proclamations were issued, which is requiring some diplomatic mer months. efforts to smooth over. There is little love lost between Germany and the States. The British government has appointed Mr. C. W. Elliot, C. B., British High Commissioner to Samoa, and a conference will likely take trough factory. Good boy, David. place. -The "debate on the address fiction is still "on" at Ottawa. The whole policy of the government, and a good deal more, is at this time discussed, and dozens of members want to have their say-of course. Young Sir Charles Tupper's vague Yukon charges against Minister Sifton have fallen flat. The government hedge at nothing, they court inspection, but naturally want charges laid. The effect of the great speeches of Laurier and Sifton have without doubt strengthened the confidence of the country in the present administration.

THE WINTER'S PRECIPITATION.

Through the kindness of Dr. Gun, the official observer here for the Provincial meteorological authorities, we are able to present the following figures as to rainfall and snowfall since the beginning of November last. The total is much above the average: over feet of snow is a phenomenal fall, though Owen Sound observers say that over 20 feet has fallen in their locality. Certainly the east has had a generous supply for the C. P. R. authorities never had such trouble as during the past winter to keep their tracks open.

The lake levels, which a few years ago, had fallen over a foot were last year noticed to be rising again. This winter's procipitation will help in the same direction.
