BY-LAW NO. 354

A BY-LAW to aid and assist "The Durham Furniture Company, Limited," in building and operating a Furniture Factory in the Town of Durham.

WHEREAS, a joint stock company has been organized in the Town of Durham, known as "The Durham Furniture Company, Limited," for the purpose of manufacturing furniture in the Town of Durham; and whereas the said Company is desirous of building a Factory and of having the same completed and in running order during the year 1899; and whereas the Company has applied to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham for aid by way of loan, of the sum of \$10,000, to the Company, in accordance with the terms of an agreement herein after referred to.

And WHEREAS, it is deemed expedient and desirable, to loan the said sum of \$10,000, to the said Company for said purpose.

And WHEREAS, the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Town of Durham, according to the last revised Assessment Roll thereof, being the Assessment Roll for the year 1898, is \$900,732.

And WHEREAS, the existing Debenture debt of the said Town of Durham amounts to the sum of \$21,128. No principal and no interest being in arrears.

THEREFORE, the Corporation of the Town of Durham, by the Council thereof, enacts as follows:

1. It shall and may be lawful for the Municipal Council of the said Corporation of the Town of Durham to aid the said "The Durham Furniture Company, Limited," in the erection and completion of a Factory, for the manufacture of Furniture within the limits of the said Corporation, by lending the said Company the sum of \$10,000, repayable without interest in eight consecutive annual instalments, the first seven of \$1,000 each, at the ends of the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth years, and a final instalment of \$3,000 at the end of the tenth year, in accordance with the terms of an agreement to be entered into between the said "The Durham Furniture Company Limited, and the Corporation of the Town of Durham,

2. For that purpose it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Town of Durham to borrow Ten Thousand Dollars and to issue Debentures of the said Municipality to said amount, in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars each payable at the end of ten years from the date on which this By-Law takes effect, and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding four per centum per annum, payable yearly on the first day of January during the currency of said Debentures.

3. The said Debentures shall bear date on the day hereinafter appointed, for the coming into force of this By-Law, shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the Town of Durham, be signed by the Mayor thereof and bear interest at the rate of four per centum per annum from the date thereof, until respectively due as hereinafter specified, which interest shall be payable yearly, on the first day of January in each year, at the Standard Bank, in the Town of Durham, where also the said Debentures shall be payable.

4. The said Debentures shall have attached thereto Coupons for the payment of the interest thereon.

5. During the currency of the said debt while any of the said Debentures remain unpaid, there shall be raised, assessed and levied yearly upon the whole rateable property in the Town of Durham the sum of \$1283.90, and the amounts to be raised for principal and interest in each year shall be as follows:

6. This By-Law shall come into force on the day of the final passing thereof by this Council.

7. The votes of the electors of the Municipality of the Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-Law on Monday, the Eighth day of May, 1899, commencing at the hour of Nine of the clock in the morning, and closing at the hour of five of the clock in the afternoon of the same day as follows:

In North Ward at the house of Norman Kelsey, by Clifton Elvidge as Deputy Returning Officer; in East Ward at the Town Hall, by W. B. Vollet as Deputy Returning Officer, and in West Ward at Mrs. McCreary's house, by John Smith as Deputy Returning Officer.

8. On Saturday, the Sixth day of May, 1899, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Mayor of the Town of Durham, will attend at the office of the Town Clerk, in the Town of Durham, for the purpose of appointing in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up by the Town Clerk, of the votes polled on this By-Law, and also of appointing one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in, and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-Law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in, and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-Law.

9. On Tuesday, the Ninth day of May, 1899, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, at the Town Hall, in the Town of Durham, the Clerk of the Town of Durham will proceed to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-Law.

BY-LAW NO. 355.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Town of Durham has resolved to grant aid by way of partial exemption from taxation for the promotion of the Industry of the Manufacture of Chairs and Furniture in the Town of Durham.

Therefore the Corporation of the Town of Durham by the Council thereof enacts as follows:

That the Assessment for Taxes to be levied on the land, buildings and Machinery of the Durham Furniture Co. Limited, and also their stock Manufactured and in process of manufacture Said land and building being situate on Lots 5 and 6 on the north side of Lambton St., composed of 6 acres, shall not exceed the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty dollars for a term of ten years from the passing of this By-Law.

And the Votes of the electors of the Municipality in the Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-Law on Monday the 8th day of May, commencing at the hour of 9 of the clock in the morning and closing at the hour of 5 o'clock the same day as follows:—

In North Ward at the House of Norman Kelsey, by Clifton Elvidge, Deputy Returning Officer.

In East Ward at the Town Hall by W. B. Vollet as Deputy Returning Officer.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.
TORONTO.
Difficulty in procuring space and uncertainty as to where the boats will sail from, coupled with weak English cablegrams, is all injuriously affecting the trade in shipping cattle. Trade to-day was slow, and prices weaker, with five cents as the best price. The range is from 4 1/2 to 5c. For loads of good stuff scaling from 1,200 to 1,300 lbs each, the price is from \$4.00 to \$5 per cwt.

The supply of butcher cattle was scarce to-day, and the quality none too good; but trade was brisk, and the good stuff was readily caught up at from 4 to 4 1/2c per pound; and some extra choice lots sold at a little higher figures. Several loads of good cattle sold at from \$3.25 to \$5.75 per cwt.; and some common lots sold down to \$3 per cwt.

Stockers continue easy at from \$3.25 to \$3.75 per cwt., with occasional sales of choice up to \$3.90.

Shipping bulls, milk cows, etc., are quiet and unchanged.

Yearling lambs were a shade more easy to day, and a good many poor specimens were among the supplies. The best grain-fed yearlings sold this morning at from \$4.75 to \$5.40 per cwt., and common "barnyard" lambs fetched from \$1.25 to \$4.00.

Ewes were worth from 3 1/2 to 4c per lb, Bucks are fetching from 3 to 3 1/2c per pound.

We had a couple of dozen spring lambs, mostly of poor quality, and they sold from \$2 to \$5 each. Some better grades are in request.

Cattle were plentiful, poor in quality, and weaker in price; they sold to-day at from \$2 to \$3 each, the latter being an outside price.

Scarcely four hundred hogs were sent in to-day, but we are unable to announce any change in figures.

The top price of "singers" is 4 1/2c per lb; light are bringing 4c, and heavy fat hogs sell at not more than 4c.

Stags are fetching 3c per lb.
