The Irish Catholic members of the Liberal party in Ontario will hold a convention in Toronto on May 23, to discuss political matters.

The Americans, on assuming control of Porto Rico, at once closed its ports to foreign commerce. The Canadian government protested and the Americans have given orders for all shipping to have freedom of Porto Rico ports. This concession is a generous one and will no doubt be appreciated.

Dr. Hanford, M. P. for Macdonald, presented a resolution to parliament favoring government control of railways, through the exercise of powers granted to a railway commission. The methods of both our trunk lines have caused irritation of late, particularly the alleged withdrawal of the Kettle River Valley bill, coming to an understanding between C. P. R. and C. P. R.

At a Sunday School Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, the color question came up. The chairman of the local committee welcomed the negro, hoped he would enjoy the convention, were willing to give him every right and privilege, but must draw the line at sitting in the same pew with him! This had to be carried out, and the Georgia people think they have made a great concession in allowing the seats to be in the floor of the house and not segregate them to the gallery! **PARE AND HOLDEN ESCAPE.**

As we briefly announced in our last week's issue, these two worthies, held as given evidence in the Ponton case, escaped from Nanawau jail. The despatch below gives the details of the escape, for which ample opportunity seems to have been given since they had from 7 p. m. till 6:30 a. m. to work unmolested. The theory that they had accomplices is being discarded, and Pare's wonderful ingenuity must get the whole credit.

NANAWAU, May 2.—This morning at 6:30, when Turnkey Clark made his rounds of the cells of the jail he discovered the corridor open leading to Pare's cell, and upon further investigation discovered that the notorious safe-crackers, Pare and Holden, had both escaped during the night. Everything has the appearance of Pare doing the job. Three skeleton keys were found in an old coat in the cell, the lock of his and the adjoining cells were both unlocked and the locks so tampered with that they cannot be worked. The brick wall between Pare's cell and the adjoining one had been dug through from Pare's side, the bricks being piled under Pare's cot. When Pare reached the corridor he wrenched a piece of iron bar, about 15 inches long, from the steam-heating fixtures. After accomplishing this he proceeded upstairs to the eastern corridor, where his cot, Holden, was confined. He unlocked this corridor also, which gave him access to Holden's cell, which he unlocked at once. Then the two notorious safe robbers proceeded to the door leading to the jail yard. This lock Pare evidently could not pick, as he had to pry it apart with the iron secured from the steam-pipes. When once in the jail yard the work was about completed, as all they had to do was pile up a lot of cordwood to within five feet of the top of the jail wall, which was about 20 feet high. Then they tied their wooden blankets together, fastening one end with a large cordwood stick, and throwing the other end to which a snare was attached, over the wall. No idea can be formed as to the time of their escape. The last seen of them was when the turnkey visited the cells at 7 o'clock last night. The news of their escape caused about as much excitement in town as the bank robbery did itself.

They are reported to have been seen both east and west but have not yet been found. One of the observers was Mr. George McKelvie, son of Mr. John McKelvie, of this town. The Mail and Empire of Thursday last has the following:

"George McKelvie the well-known West-end blacksmith is prepared to swear that he saw Pare and Holden twice on Thursday. So sure is Mr. McKelvie of the correctness of his belief that he notified the police yesterday and the detectives are consequently working on the case. The officers will not say what their opinion of McKelvie's story is. McKelvie states that he was at work in his blacksmith shop 816 Bathurst street, about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. When two men stepped into his shop, and one of them asked him for a tin pail for a few minutes. This he gave them, and they went to an adjoining hotel to get some beer, as they expressed it. They failed to

return with the pail. He again saw the men about 10 o'clock Tuesday night, and next morning he found the pail in his shop, but how they entered the place he is at a loss to account for, as the door was securely fastened. When he saw the pictures of Pare and Holden in the Mail and Empire he at once recognized the men he had seen, and notified the police."
