Breakfast is an early meal, and is followed by letter writing and reading the newspapers, which are attended to by Eugenie's two devoted friends. She sometimes visits the village of Farnborough in the morning, and regularly before luncheon every day a visit is made to the museum on the grounds where the Emperor and the Princess Imperial are buried. The afternoon the Empress usually spends in walking through the grounds. On her visits to London Eugenie is accompanied always by four servants. Her comfortable and dignified estate of semi-royalty is maintained with her own fortune, which is said to be large enough to keep her in luxury and will probably continue to be sufficient for the rest of her life. She gives liberally to charities in the neighborhood of her English home. Her entire time is spent in Farnborough, save for occasional visits to London, which are made to attend to her business interests. She is said not to be sad, in spite of the loneliness of her life. She has a bicycle track at Farnborough, for her young relatives, and takes great delight in their society when they visit her. The friendship of Queen Victoria has always been a boon to her, and the English sovereign has never failed to recognize her equal rights. In the official court journal, every mention of the Empress is made to place her on an exact equal footing with the Queen.

Few persons who have seen the German Empress would believe that she spends money extravagantly on her dresses, yet she is said to keep twelve women constantly employed on her wardrobe, under the supervision of a maid of honor. When she is about to take a journey requiring special ceremony this number is increased to forty, and for every wedding she attends the Empress is said to order fifteen new dresses. In addition to the dresses made in her private establishment, there are court gowns brought from Vienna to be worn on state occasions. These are so long that the trains have to be carried to enable the Empress to walk, and are frequently studded with jewels. The value of one dress, including the jewels applied to the train, is said to have been \$20,000. The rule at the German court makes it impossible for the Empress to appear twice at the same functions in the same costume, and much of the work done by the twelve dressmakers is in making alterations so that the rule may not be broken and the dresses have a different look though they are really the same. The Empress, when in full dress wears many jewels. Some of these are the property of the Crown, and she is entitled to use them only so long as her husband remains Emperor. FASHION AS A REFORMER.

Fashion is responsible for many evils, but now and then it does the world a good turn. It is doing so now in China for what persuasion and reasoning could only do in a small measure accomplish in the direction of the suppression of foot-binding, fashion is effecting much more quickly. The governor of Hunan, until lately the most bitterly anti-foreign of all the provinces of China, has issued a proclamation discouraging the cruel custom throughout his province. Anti-foot-binding societies are multiplying rapidly in the province. One society numbers thousands of members, who pay two taels—a little less than a dollar and three-quarters—entrance money, and one Mexican dollar—about half an American dollar—as an annual subscription afterward. The fact that the majority of those entering the society are paying members shows that the movement is among the better classes, and that foot-binding is becoming unfashionable. The proceeds of the members' fees is devoted to a good purpose, not that the providing of dowries for poor girls who could not otherwise find respectable husbands because they had natural-sized feet. A very decided indication of the growing unfashionableness of foot-binding is furnished by a conversation overheard on board a river steamer in China. Several well-to-do young men of China were discussing the question of what sort of wife one of their number, who was contemplating matrimony, ought to try to secure. Among other advantages he was advised to look for a wife with natural feet, as bound feet were already reckoned unfashionable. The tracts written against the cruelty of foot-binding are in great demand. Even non-Christians write against the evil, but they are frank enough to confess that it was the Christian ladies who led the way to the reform, and they circulate the missionary tracts along with their own.
