OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

Ten Months Trade Returns. The ten months trade returns to April 30th shows an increase in the business of the Dominion of nearly \$19,000,000, of which the month of April alone is credited with \$2,325,000. This in itself is highly gratifying, but it is still more satisfactory to notice the increase in the importation of free goods which are the raw material of various home industries. Crude rubber and gutta-percha, undressed skins, iron and steel, (unmanufactured) anthracite coal, hemp and manilla, wool, hides and skins, dyes and chemicals, etc., all show considerable increases and all of these are the raw material needed for the growing business of the factories of the Dominion. Not only are all the old industries increasing their ramifications, but new factories are springing up each week in various parts of the country, and the permanency of Canada's trade and the confidence of her people in her future, continues to grow and strengthen.

Unable To Handle The Business. Although the majority of practical men anticipated a general revival of trade with the change of Government three years ago, there were not a few apparently, unprepared for quite such a tremendous and continued rush as has been experienced since. Take for instance the railway car works, several attempts have been made to score against the Government for purchasing sleepers and parlor cars for the Inter-colonial Railway from American firms and the changes have been industriously rung upon the cry of, "Canada for Canadians". But from the facts given by the Minister of Railways in the House this week it was Hobson's choice with the Department. Every effort was made to find Canadian factories that could turn out the work, but in every case the firms communicated with declined to tender because they were so loaded down with orders that it was impossible to handle more. The Department needed these cars for the opening of the spring tourists season, and therefore has no alternative than to place the orders with the Wagner Palace Car Company whose tenders were the lowest of the United States firms.

It Has Come To Stay. British financiers are generally credited with a reasonably clear insight into current events and fairly sound judgment. Here is what the Financial News (of London, Eng.) says in the course of an article on the Budget:—"Canada has waited a long time for her expansion, but it is not open to doubt that the time has come at last, and it is none the less satisfying because it is not coming with a boom and a rush (for Klondike, for this purpose, may be disregarded,) but is taking the surer form of a steady quickening of the national pulse."

The many thousand fraternal societies and members throughout the country will be interested in the statement of the Minister of Finance, that the Government has decided not to proceed further this session with the bill dealing with Friendly Society insurance business. The necessity for legislation in the matter is very generally recognized, in fact the societies themselves have long been urging the Government to take action, but in a matter affecting so many interests, it is only to be expected that considerable diversity of opinion would exist as to the best course to be pursued. The Government desires to give those interested, the fullest opportunity to make known their wants and wishes, and by delaying legislation until next session the several societies concerned will have every opportunity of thoroughly analyzing the proposed bill, and pronouncing their well-considered views thereon.

The Insidious Lobby. [A local company asked parliament to charter to build a bridge across the Ottawa river, they were asking no favors or privileges and admittedly it was a needed structure, but local rival interests, by persistent "lobbying" secured its defeat. Our correspondent scores this bad practice in the following paragraph. Ed.]

The political lobby is an essentially Yankee institution and one of the worst features in American politics. This is not the first time that it has made itself felt in the corridors of the Canadian Parliament, in fact very few measures affecting vested interests either favorably or adversely, come before Parliament without causing the appearance of the smooth-tongued and ubiquitous lobbyist. No better instance of this could be given than in the case of the Yukon Railway bill last session, when the notorious Lyster and his colleagues appeared in the interests of the American coast transportation companies, and succeeded in cajoling the Canadian Senate into refusing to give Canadian merchants facilities for getting the trade of the Yukon with the aid of the railway route through our own country. In the very nature of things, the influence of the lobbyist must be in

every sense pernicious, and the moral sense of the community should be given in emphatic support of their representatives in Parliament to resist and destroy so baneful an agency.

Orchardville.

In the afternoon of the 23rd a few friends (we would have liked to have seen many more) of the school gathered to enjoy the program given by the pupils of the school and the very patriotic loyal and encouraging address of Rev. W. J. Magwood. The patriotism and loyalty expressed in the several recitations and songs given by the pupils. Rev. Mr. Magwood's address and the beautiful emblems on the blackboard ought to make any Canadian proud of his country and of the great Empire of which Canada forms so important a part. The following essay formed part of the program, and was composed and read by Emily Eddington a little girl 12 years old:

"CANADA THE LAND OF THE MAPLE." Canada is my native country and the land of the maple, which we may tap with the tapping gauge and cause the sap to run, so that if we boil it we can make the best of maple sugar, which has sweetened many a cup of tea and coffee for the early settler—not forgetting the taffy pull for the young people of the present.

Canada was settled by people of every nation, kindred and tongue, and is looked up to and respected by all the powers, even to our cousin lying to the south of us—the Yankee.

All religious beliefs are tolerated, also free speech. We have as good government as any country, not excepting Old England. We have our members of parliament. Where are any to excel them? Sir John A. Macdonald and his followers went to England and got together men with capital sufficient to build the Canadian Pacific Railway, extending from Montreal via Winnipeg to New Westminster, or in other words from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

Wealth is more equally divided; not so many very rich or very poor. Blessings with a climate which other nations do not enjoy, a healthy cold winter, a beautiful spring and summer, not forgetting the Indian summer in the autumn.

We have beautiful plumaged birds, such as the Robin, Woodpecker, Red-bird, etc.

Our produce, such as wheat, oats, peas, barley, rye, butter, cheese, eggs, beef, pork, mutton, poultry, fruit and horses are not excelled in all the known world.

Our volunteers are renowned as the bravest. Did they not go, when called, to the Fenian Raid in 1860, also to help England to take her way up the Nile in boats in 1881, when General Gordon lost his life while defending Kartoum? Did they not quell the Indians in the Northwest under General Middleton in 1885?

The land of the maple is destined to be—if I may say so—one of the greatest countries in the world; for the land of the Maple—and may God save our Queen."

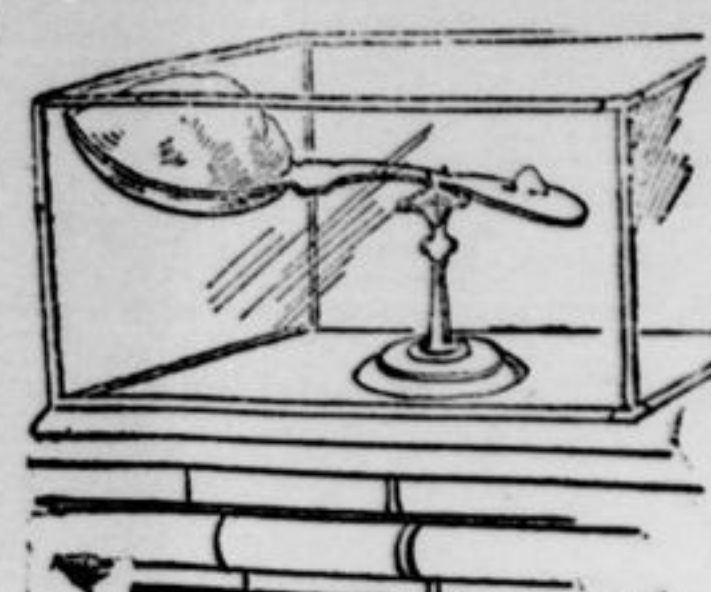
