DREYFUS.

Dreyfus, the victim for four years, of an insane French militaryism, is in French soil again, and though nominally a prisoner still, will soon be reinstated. His sufferings have aged him greatly, and the meeting between him and his wife is said to have been extremely pathetic. The Associated Press report of the meeting is as follows: "The Governor of the prison sent Madame Dreyfus the news of the arrival of her husband, and she immediately went to the Governor and asked permission to see the prisoner. Leave being granted, the faithful wife entered the prison almost unobserved, and was conducted to cell No. 830, accompanied by Madame Havet. The meeting between the long-parted husband and wife can better be imagined than described. Naturally it was most touching. Both Dreyfus and his wife were deeply affected. They remained long clasped in each other's arms, tears and smiles intermingling with tender endearments. Madame Dreyfus issued from the prison in a state of collapse. She found her husband much aged, with beard and hair whitened, and body shrunk and stooped. She said Dreyfus saw nothing of the events of the two past years. The weeping wife acknowledged the courtesy with which she had been treated. The gendarme who was ordered to be present at the interview carried out instructions and kept at a discreet distance."

Council met June 26th. Minutes of previous meeting as well as special meeting of June 9th, approved. Council Sharp reported that he met the commission from Normanby at McCannell's lake. He examined roadway and found it in a bad state of repair. He recommended that the creek running across the road be deepened, and that the creek on the west side of the road be deepened until the water gets a proper fall.

McInnis—Hastie—That we accept Mr. Sharpe's report re the means advised to improve the roadway at lot 2 of 21, on the Gravel Road, and that Mr. Sharpe be appointed to interview the Normanby council on June 27th, asking them to co-operate with us to have said roadway improved. Carried.

Cum. Hastie reported that he let a job of gravelling at lots 20 and 21, concession 19, to Herman Haw, 35 rods, 5 feet wide, 7 inch deep for \$12 work done. Payment recommended.

McQueen—Sharp—That Mr. Hastie's report be adopted and order granted. Carried.

McInnis—Sharp—That the clerk communicate with the township clerk of Normanby re the performance of the statute labor on the O. S. road with the view of having the expenditure of said statute labor claims adjusted. Carried.

McInnis—McQueen—That the road commissioner for road Division No. 1 take the necessary steps to have the obstruction in the stream at lot 30, concession 3 removed. Carried.

Hastie—McQueen—That Mr. Sharp be instructed to build a bridge opposite W. Ellis, Main Street, Holstein. Carried.

McQueen—Sharp—That we instruct the reeve to have two notices placed on each of our large bridges, forbidding any person or persons driving or riding over them faster than a walk. Carried.

McInnis—McQueen—That we accept the tender of Royal Grafton, of Peel, to build a bridge at lots 25 and 26, concession 8, for the sum of \$216 less the sum of \$22 for covering already on the ground, and also to remove the broken bridge at that place. Said bridge to be 62 feet long, 13 feet wide with centre rail. The whole to be completed on or before the first day of August, 1899, and a bond of agreement be executed by the reeve on behalf of the municipality. Carried.

Hastie—McQueen—That a by-law, be introduced at next meeting of council to fix a grant in aid of building snow fences in places that are liable to be blocked with snow in winter. Carried.

McInnis—Sharp—That leave be granted at next meeting of council to introduce a by-law regulating the running at large on our highways of horses, cattle, sheep, pigs, poultry, etc. Carried.

McInnis—Hastie—That the reeve and Mr. McQueen have the abutments at Arthur's bridge, lot 25, concession 8, ready for the superstructure as soon as possible.

The reeve reported that he was notified to have the site of the new bridge located at the deviation. Commissioners McInnis and McQueen were notified and we met and located the site.

Sharp—Hastie—That the reeve's report be adopted and order granted for one dollar each. Carried.
