The great interest taken by Prussian family in the recent congress at Berlin for the prevention of tuberculosis, and the message which Queen Victoria sent to it expressing her warm approval and blessing, have been referred to by European correspondents as striking proof of the attention now given to disease problems. But it would be strange indeed if, after the revelations which have been made in recent years regarding the ravages of the deadly tubercle bacilus, sovereigns did not take an interest in the war that medical men have declared against it.




