Marks obtainable in entrance examination 100, in P. S. Leaving 125, of which 50 for Entrance and 65 for Leaving besides one third of the marks in each subject were required for passing. To secure an Entrance Certificate on the Leaving examination one-fourth of the marks in the Entrance subjects were required.
