Seeker-Dying off Like Sheep.

Weird Story Related by a Returned Gold-

A despatch from Vancouver, BC., says -" They were dying like sheep all around me," said C. W. Petrie, just back from a fifteen months' trip up the all-Canadian route to Klondike, via the Strickeen river, "I cannot give details; I cannot remember names. Myself and another French-Canadian reached eighty miles up the Teslin where a number of men were prospecting with great luck. It was a rich diggings. We set at work at once and struck it lucky right off. On the sec ond day we became sick with a strange malady, and crawled to another tent for help. Here we found one man dead and two dying. They told us that the
