### AFTER TWENTY YEARS.

**DR. LANDERKIN SECURES A SETTLEMENT OF AN OLD CLAIM.**

Geo. McDonald Righted.

It is ancient history now, this claim, away back in 1870, the volunteer militia of those days met in camp at Garrison Common, Toronto. While there on duty for their country, some of the volunteers contracted typhoid fever, and it was proved that the cause of the attack was bad water and unsanitary surroundings, both preventable evils.

Naturally, the sufferers and their friends looked to the government of the day for some compensation for a loss occasioned through no fault of their own, and the matter was brought up in parliament while yet the matter was fresh in men's minds, but for some reason or no reason nothing was done, a simple act of justice was shelved and the men had to foot their own bills.

Several times in Dr. Landerkin's career he pressed this claim on the Conservative Government, but the Conservative party, including Dr. Sproule of East Grey, who must have been personally cognizant of the justice of the claims, invariably succeeded in shelving it while Conservatives at home no doubt thought Dr. Landerkin was trying to make political capital rather than believing in the merits of the case.

The wheel of time brought the overthrow of 1896, and the Liberals found many old scores and old claims awaiting action or adjustment. Among these was the Volunteer claim of Geo. McDonald of this town and others, and though in this case the amount is very small, yet in the aggregate, their estimates every year have been swelled by delayed claims, which in the amplitude of power had been pigeon-holed and forgotten, or waiting to be attended to "tomorrow."

The settlement of this particular claim has been deferred under Liberal auspices, by the illness of the Minister of Militia during last session, the deputy Minister not venturing to "pass" such antiquated claims. The claim originally allowed by law was 50 cents a day, but Dr. Landerkin has urged that he be allowed \$1 a day in lieu of interest for his 42 days illness, and has at last succeeded in securing it, Mr. McDonald having received the check last week.

It is with great pleasure we refer to this matter. As the constancy of purpose displayed by our worthy representative while his opponents of his party were in power is especially commendable. It reflects credit too on the Liberal government, who after all these years, recognizing the justice of the claim, settle it.

Not once or twice has it been shown that Dr. Landerkin remembers his promises whether given to friend or foe, and tries faithfully to fulfil them.
