by way of experiment. GOAT SKINS ARE IMPORTED.

In his recent pamphlet Captain Barnes calls attention merely to the profit that may be derived from the pursuit of a neglected industry. He intends to encourage goat-herding and goat-breeding as a regular occupation of the American agriculturist, and another pamphlet is soon to follow, in which methods of keeping goats will be explained in detail. In the pamphlet just issued Captain Barnes calls attention in the first place to the enormous increase in importations of goat skins. 1864, when goat skins were first separately classified, the imported hides were valued at some \$1,800,-000, but by the close of the last fiscal year the invoice value amounted to \$15,750,000, making an actual value of over \$25,500,000. means the slaughter of over 16,000, 000 goats and kids per year.

As they can be purchased at an average price of \$2 per head and then allowed to multiply, consuming almost no valuable food, Captain Barnes points out that the gross profit derived from the sale of skins, milk and mehair would be practically a net profit. The cost of the labor is also very small, a single herdsman being able to take care of an entire flock. Interesting statistics are given showing that the surplus unskilled labor in various sections of the country runs in direct proportion to the untilled lands. This argument, to judge by letters received by the Agricultural Department, has had its effect upon the South, where the farmers would be glad to find work for some of the idle negroes.

While the cheapness of the goat is the primary consideration, positive advantages are also to be derived from the trespass of goats upon any soil.
