THE WORLD'S FAIR.

Happy Crowds and Good Exhibits.

Tuesday, Oct. 3.—Egremont Society to-day, is again in luck having had splendid weather, and a large turn out as usual.

The live stock, especially in horses, was very good. Not many shows could turn out 5 such fine teams as entered in the Agricultural class. The prizes too were well distributed among a lot of competitors.

The bicycle races aroused interest, but the track is too circumscribed to allow of speed, and the falls were numerous. There was a suspicion of "monkeying" with the race too.

C. McInnes had two bulls on the grounds, and beat P. Dickson with his Jersey, but got 2nd with his Durham. Judge Brigham had no easy task to decide on the 1-yr old bulls, the three shown being all good.

Caldwell Bros are great prizewinners as usual and so is Thos Orchard. In the long wool sheep classes there was keen competition between Swanton, J. R. Smith and McInnes. Bowman had good stock in the short wool in the ewe classes.

The fowl, after Durham, looks slim in quantity. There is great room for expansion in this line.

Potatoes made a good show, but turnips were behind; so were the citron and similar classes. Fruit display was held up by excellent apples.

The Dairy is a department that always shows up well in finely watered Egremont and connoisseurs say it was above the average. The judges here gave Mrs. Mountain 2nd for loat bread. In the sweet stuffs we noticed W. J. Adams' name prominent.

The ladies' work in needlework was excellent, and in mats was immense. Don't think we ever saw so many mats at a show. Abundance of other good things, and we actually heard a remark made "as good as Durham."

The few works of art shown were very good, and the flower display better than we have seen it.

Durham band was engaged for the day, and their music was a pleasing feature.

The Society has two fine flags, which S. Grey should borrow next year or get new ones of their own.

First visitors are always struck with the romantic situation and fine hall.

Dr. Landerkin, M. P., was on the grounds and met many friends. Dr. McLean and A. Wenger, Aytton, were also visitors. Mrs. Winkler, Hanover, was a guest of Mrs. W. S. Horsburgh for the day.

From Durham besides the band we noticed the two editors, C. McKinnon, W. Caldwell, P. Patterson, A. Robertson, J. L. Browne.

Hotel-keeper Klempf made every arrangement for a crowd and was not disappointed, though of course the supply overflowed.
