For the Week Ending Oct. 7th 1900.

Rainfall nil, but the hours of sunshine numbered 50.8. Winds for the week variable but generally of a southerly and south-easterly direction. The meteorological office reports the rain-fall to have been last month above the average in Eastern Ontario and Quebec but in the other portions of the Dominion it did not differ much from the average. In Manitoba and the Territories the weather conditions were fine, so that the largest crop grown in the history of the West was successfully harvested.
