THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

Continued from Supplement.

Mr. Richardson, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Campbell, said they could not but be benefited by his able address, and if the members of council were no doubt the county would be. While railroads were being built and gave good satisfaction public roads were often neglected, and it was time they were attended to.

Mr. Frost seconded the vote of thanks saying the address was very opportune. The county years ago had expended large sums on county roads, and made good ones too. But the council in its wisdom, had given up that system, and the roads, had gone back in condition. There had been movements several times in the direction of taking back the roads under county management, and at one time only one vote had stood in the way. Several causes had combined to create this movement; one of these causes was the advent of the bicycle, the users of which had become so numerous and united in their demands for good roads. But to Mr. Campbell, the gentleman who had so ably addressed them on this question, is due in a great measure the present movement. He would ask the members of council to inspect the work which had been done on the streets of Owen Sound, which were both thorough and permanent, and bore testimony to the good system of roadmaking laid down by Mr. Campbell.

The motion was carried by a standing vote, after which adjournment was made until Wednesday afternoon. Advertiser.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

At 3 p.m. Warden Gorson took the chair and called the members to order. Accounts amounting in all to \$82,90 were received from Commissioners Allan, Schenk, Brown, Brigham and Peterson for inspecting and letting bridge contracts. The other accounts were small and for incidental or printing expenses.

Mr. Preston reported for the finance committee recommending (1) the payment of the following accounts: John McDonald, country property, \$7; Owen Sound, \$10; of "the mill for June sessions \$28; Clerk of the Pease, scrapping rooms \$2; express charges 25 cents; Coop Clark & Co., juron books \$8.50; R. J. Edgar \$3.25; Parker & Co. 85 cents; T. R. Weir \$1.75; freight charges \$2.02. The report also recommended that the warden issue his order for \$150 to be deposited in the bank as a special stationery account, and reported that stationery had been distributed among the various officials as follows: sheriff \$2.88; jailer \$4.35; judges chambers \$11.49; clerk of the surrogate courts \$54.63; clerk of the peace \$19.10; county clerk \$4.31; county auditor \$3.08 and county treasurer \$5.43.

The report was adopted without objection being raised.

Mr. McKinnon presented a report from the road bridge committee recommending the payment of the following accounts: T. R. Fawcett building bridge town line of Collingwood and Euphrasia \$10; repairing bridge town line St. Vincent and Euphrasia, \$68; John Lobsinger, cedar to cover bridge on county line between Grey and Bruce, half share \$3.75; L. Pfeffer building bridge on bridge north of Hanover on county line, half share \$132, bolts 15 cents; and James Lorker, inspecting and plan, \$4.82; James Gresn, repairing approaches of steel bridges north of Hanover on county line, lime, sand, and repairing wooden bridge 50 cents; H. Brigham, lumber for bridge on county line north of Hanover, \$6.30; F. Himbecker repairing bridge, \$3.15; John Morrison repairing bridge on town line of Holland and Glenelg \$10; Robert Crawford repairing bridge on county line between Grey and Bruce, \$87.50; town of Thornbury, repairing bridge, \$3.10; Jas. Arthur, repairing bridges on county line between Grey and Wellington, \$31.50; Robt. Eden covering bridge on Township line between Egremont and Normandy, \$25; D. Allisday, repairing bridge on boundary line between Grey and Wellington, \$3.75; Alex. McMillan repairing bridge on town line between Holland and Glenelg, \$14.35; John McCann, repairing bridge on town line between Holland and Glenelg, \$4; Thos. Williscroft, \$14.50 and Chas. McKinnon \$15 inspecting bridges on town line between Holland and Glenelg.—Times.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

A number of accounts as usual were presented, and referred to committee. Two deputations were present in connection with appointing arbitrators for the formation of a new school section in Euphrasia. Considerable time was occupied in hearing these gentlemen. One delegation was for and the other against the formation of a school section.

The Public School Inspectors' reports showed a decrease in North Grey of the number who wrote on entrance and junior leaving examinations, and an increase in South Grey.

Reports of County Property committee recommending payment of improvements to court house, amounting in all to \$2,123.23, was adopted. Another report of the Education Committee on the school arbitration question caused considerable discussion, and two members of the opposing delegations were heard at some length. The report was finally passed and a by-law appointing Judge Creaser, John McDonald and A. Grier arbitrators was put through.

On motion Council adjourned till Friday afternoon.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Council resumed at 3 o'clock, when the results of committee meetings were manifested in a batch of reports. These were from Roads and Bridges, County Property, Printing, Communications and Memorials, and special committee

Improvement of roads. They were presented by the chairmen, Messrs. McKinnon, McDonald, Schenk, McColman and Richardson.

Discussions took place on two or three reports. In committee of the whole on Roads and Bridges with Mr. Brown in the chair, quite hot dispute took place between Messrs. Williscroft and Allan over an item of \$4, an account from one McCann for work on a bridge over the Rocky Saugeen River, performed nearly two years ago. The Warden and Mr. McKinnon, who is chairman of roads and bridges, also joined in the discussion. When about three quarters of an hour had been spent in this way, during which time the other members showed signs of great weariness, Mr. Richardson called the meeting to order for such waste of time over a trifling. The item, which the report recommended should be paid, was struck out.

Another clause of the report dealt with a broken bridge on Normanby and Main Town line, which Messrs. Allan and Schenk said was past repair. Wellington County wants a new bridge and a conference thereon, to decide on the structure, which will cost about \$1200. The report recommended that the matter be attended to as necessity demanded, and this was adopted.

A long discussion took place on the proposal of memorializing the Legislature to make a grant to general hospitals for the treatment of pauper inmates. The report recommended no action, and was so carried though Mr. Frost and some others thought the experiment should be tried.

A by-law to appoint arbitrators for the formation of a new school section in parts Egremont and Normanby was put through. Mr. Watson, who introduced the by-law, and Messrs. McDonald and Gordon were appointed arbitrators.

A by-law making Hepworth a police village was passed and comes into effect next year. Jaiet Miller's salary was increased \$100.

A hot discussion followed on a \$2000 bridge which was to cost only \$500 or so, but as the discussion was lengthy, we will give it all next week.
