TOWN COUNCIL.

Met Monday evening. Present Mayor Calder, Councillors Hunter, Sparling Moore, Kinnee, Gorsline.

A deputation of the ladies of the W. C. T. U. waited on the Council with a petition asking action to prevent or lessen the sale of cigarettes by requiring a license from vendors. Municipalities elsewhere are doing this and the council promised at their next meeting to hear them again in the matter.

The finance committee's report caused a discussion and division seldom seen in town. Council was divided 3 and 3 as to passing it, the object being to fund their objections on the fact that it contained items for work done on the Queen St improvements, which would implicate the council in the paying of over \$400 while the amount promised by the council was strictly limited to \$200.

An unfortunate situation has been created. The motion granting only \$2.0 from council is explicit. The work is done and a good job, costing however over \$400, with no resources in sight except the council's grant, unless it be from the Methodist body, who having given the right of way, may feel they have given enough.

It is a clear case of proceeding without counting the cost, and the Board of Works composed of Messrs Sparling, Kinnee and Moore, must be considered as having exceeded their instructions. How to safeguard them as individuals without taking \$200 more from the town is the problem. Messrs Calder, Gorsline and Hunter determined to safeguard the town and the Mayor for the first time in his experience gave his double vote in the same direction. The 3 members outvoted then left the table in a body, and there being no quorum the Council had to rise.
