Dr. Albert B. Simpson, on last Sunday night, at the fifteenth annual convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, held in Carnegie Hall, succeeded in beating his own record as a collector of contribution money.

If I were the sporting reporter 1 would say that Dr. Simpson is the duce her wealth, and all eyes should champion money raiser of the world, He has held the championship stnce 1894, when he startled Christendom by raising in a single night—the night of October 17th-at Old Orchard, Me. the immense sum of \$40,000 in voluntary subscriptions for his own special church missionary work in foreign lands. Then, naving beaten all records. he proceeded to beat his own records On October 17th, 1895, at Carnegie Hall, he raised \$80,000; on August 9th, 1896, at Old Orchard. Me., he collected \$101,500; on the following October 17th, at Carnegie Hall again, he collected \$100,000; on October 16th, 1898, still at Carnegie Hall, he collected \$112,000.

Last Sunday put the climax to the record. The sum of \$164,000 was raised amount staggered belief, yet the pledge was signed with the name of a responsible business man. Dr. Simpson, when I saw him a day or two o ago, assured me he had no doubt the pledge would be kept. He would not reveal the name of the party who had made it.

Even if it should turn out that the \$100,000 was subscribed in an ebulition of temporary enthusiasm, which may be reneged by sober second thought, the sum of \$64,000, which is positively assured, is a phenomenal one. There is no parallel to it, no remote approximation to it, in all the history of subscription, save only in such portions of that history as have been supplied by Dr. Simpson himself. Go outside of Dr. Simpson's record, and the fall is stupendous. In 1895, for example, there was a notable missionary meeting in Carnegie Hall. The late Dr. John Hall presided. President Cleveland came on from Washington to deliver an address. The platform was crowded with prominent people. The audience was far wealthier than any to which Dr. Simpson had ever appealed. When the collection was taken up the sum total was found to be \$5,000.
