THE WAR.

So little change in the position has taken place this week that we drop our "Day by day" style. The first pang of of humiliation soon gave way to a grim determination to carry on the war till victory was won.

To this end, from the War Office to the humblest hamlet of the empire attention has been directed, and the world wide display of enthusiastic Loyalty has been demonstrated stronger than words can do.

Generals Roberts and Kitchener ate on their way to Cape Town. Reinforcements of men, guns, cavalry, provisions, nurses are dotting the Atlantic, while the steamers Montezuma, Pomeranian and Laurentian are chartered to take away a second contingent from Canada of Cavalry and artillerymen chiefly, a few over a thousand, early in January. If the war did nothing else, it has displayed before the world a scattered empire united by sentiment only.

Thorburny, as an independent Board of arbitration. These gentlemen went over the grounds last week and have created two new Union School Sections, breaking up the absurd Egremont section 7 miles long and one lot wide, and robbing S. Sections No. 1 and No. 14 Normanby, of the lots on the 1st con. "Union S. S. No. 1" will consist of the lots in the 1st con of both townships from the town line south, to lot 2 of 9, and "Union S. S. No. 2" of the lots on the 1st con. of both townships from 3 of 9 to 2 of 18 inclusive, and as this takes a few lots from No. 2, Normanby, (McPhee's Section, already weak) an equivalent is made by placing with it a few lots from Egremont, which are more convenient to the school than to Holstein, where they have been. In Union School Sections No. 1 and No. 2, new schools will have to be built, one at or near Barber's Corner, the other at Orchardville, the two sides of the road bearing the expense equally. Normanby side, however, will have their burden lightened, as the arbitrators have recognized their vested rights in the old schools to the extent of \$75 from No. 1, and \$80 from No. 14. The expense of the award amounts to \$100, which sum is to be paid by the townships concerned. Both the old school buildings will now be badly out of centre, Blyth's especially, their location having been fixed by front road distances.
