STRAWY INDUSTRY OF GERMAN Thousands of Persons Literally Live

on it. Thousands of persons in Germany live interally "on straw," making it up into baskets, panniers, boxes, knickknacks, hats, bonnets, etc. Professional schools have even been founded where the trade is taught in all its varieties. Stalks of rye and wheat. most of them coming from Tuscany, are the material used. There the grain intended for this particular use is sowed in April and reaped in June.

The straw requires long and especial treatment, which consists in exin peculiarly-constructed boxes, to the sun, and a good deal of manipulation in the meantime. After this exposure the straw is put away and kept, under certain rules, for two years, one condition being that it must not be allowed to get wet.


