

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

Trade in cattle at the Western Cattle Market was dull.

Sheep and lambs were dull. Hogs were steady.

The quality of cattle, on the whole, was fair.

The run was light, about 500 cattle, 1,375 hogs and 250 sheep and lambs.

Prices changed but slightly. Considerable stock was unsold.

Export Cattle—Ready vessel space being unavailable, the market was dull again to-day. Offerings were not all sold. Prices ranged from \$4.50 to \$4.85 per cwt for heavy cattle and \$4.25 to \$4.40 for light weights.

Export Bulls—Fair offerings sold to a moderate demand at \$4 to \$4.35 per cwt for heavy bulls and \$3.50 to \$3.90 for lighter weights.

Butchers' Cattle—Market was comparatively dull and prices inclined weaker, especially for common to medium stock. Choice cattle sold at \$4 to \$4.25 per cwt. Good lots at \$3.50 to \$3.90, medium at \$3 to \$3.50 and common stock at \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt.

Feeders—Moderate offerings met a slow demand at steady prices of \$3.50 to \$3.75 for average feeders and \$3.80 to \$4 for choice short-keep steers.

Stockers—Not many on the market and not many wanted. Prices were unchanged.

Feeding Bulls—Bulls for fattening sold at \$2.75 to \$3.25 per cwt.

Stock Bulls—Light stock bulls sold at \$2 to \$2.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—Trade was dull and prices steady at \$3.50 to \$3.75 per cwt for export ewes, but a little lower in range at \$4.25 to \$5.50 per cwt. for lambs.

Hogs—Unchanged at \$5.22 per cwt for selections of 160 to 200 pounds, natural weight, and \$4.62½ per cwt for thick and light fats.

The average quality of lambs are very poor.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

Council met Feb. 12th pursuant to adjournment, all the members present, the Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From Messrs. Rutledge, Ramage and Irwin, tenders for printing, from C. W. Rutledge an account for advertising, from Barwick Aylesworth and Wright relative to Boyce deviation, report of committee on Treasurer's Sureties, report of Com appointed to interview Jas. P. Hunter relative to deviation, from Dr. Rice asking assistance for Free Consumptive Sanatorium, from the Municipal World an account for Assessment Rolls and Road Lists.

McCauley—McInnis—That the Report of the Reeve and Councillor Firth, as to the sufficiency of the Treasurer's Sureties be adopted and filed, and that they be paid \$1 each for their services, also \$1 for searches in the Registry office.—Car.

Arrowsmith—McCauley—That the auditors' report as read by the Council be received and adopted, and that the clerk get 200 copies of the same printed in pamphlet form for distribution among the ratepayers, and that the auditors be paid \$7 each for their services.—Carried.

Firth—McCauley—That Guy Williams be paid \$10 for 7½ cords of wood for Mrs. Dillon, also Godfrey McTaggart \$2.50 for timber wood for Hugh McDonald.—Car.

McCauley—McInnis—That as the deviation across part of lot 24 con. 11, was established under by-law No. 134 passed October 6th 1874 and Registered in the Registry office for the South Riding of the County of Grey on the 21st day of November 1874 that this Council take no further action in the matter, and that the Clerk send a copy of this resolution to Messrs. Barwick, Aylesworth & Wright, Toronto Carried.

Arrowsmith—McCauley—That C. Rutledge of the Standard be paid \$1 for advertising Court of Revision for 1898, also \$1 for 1899, and applications for Assessor 75c.—Carried.

McInnis—Arrowsmith—That C. W. Rutledge of the Standard be awarded the Township Printing for 1900, his tender being the lowest.—Carried.

McCauley—Firth—That the Report of the Reeve re. legal advice concerning the Glenelg bridge and deviation be adopted and filed, and that he be paid \$2 for his trouble.—Carried.

McCauley—McInnis—That the Reeve be instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a new bridge at lot 5 con 9, and have the contract let as soon as possible, so that contractor can get materials on the ground this winter.—Car.

Firth—McInnis—That the Municipal World be paid \$5.14 for Assessment Rolls and road lists.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That Wm. Black be paid \$1.15 for kettle for Hall. C.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—McCauley—That the Reeve, Peter McLennan and Joseph Firth be paid \$1 each for committee work, and the Reeve \$5 expenses to Owen Sound on good roads convention.—Carried.

Firth—Arrowsmith—That by-law No. 395, appointing Township officers be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on by-law book.—Carried.

McInnis—Arrowsmith—That the clerk be paid \$50 on salary.—Carried.

McCauley—Firth—That Donald McArthur be paid 75c for repairing bridge at lot 27 D. R.—Carried.

The council adjourned to April 16th at 10 a. m.
