Armored Glass.

A recent German invention is armored glass, or glass cast with wire gauze inclosed in their substance, so as to increase the resistance to pressure, shock, and the effects of heat. Tests of the new material have been made at the Chemnitz Technical Institute and the Vienna Technological Museum, which show that the armored glass is much stronger, and where the ordinary glass broke under sudden applications of pressure the strengthened material only cracked. and the cracks caused by changes of temperature did not allow either damp or flame to pass.
