A NEW FORCE. - Liquid air can now be produced at a cost of 5 cents a gallon and will no doubt, in many instances, take the place of coal. Thirty gallons will furnish the same amount of power as a ton of coal, and will therefore reduce the cost of running machinery on land and sea fully fifty per cent. It will also afford much valuable space which is now required for storing coal. For refrigerating purdoses, 55 gallons of liquid air will do the work of five tons of ice. When air is reduced to 312 degrees below zero it can be dipped up and poured out like water, Manufacturers are getting interested in the new agent and perhaps the day is not far distant when it will be quite generally
