ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met at the Orange Hall in the town of Eugenia on Saturday, the fifth day of May, A. D. 1900. There were present Reeve McTear and Councillors Muir, Kells, Boyd and Thompson. The reeve in the chair. Minutes of session of April 7th, 1900, were read and confirmed. A petition of Nelson Watson and four other ratepayers of S. S. No. 14, asking to have the boundaries of said section changed by admitting some lots from the township of Euphrasia making it a union section with Euphrasia was presented and read.

Thompson—Boyd—That Mr Muir be added to the committee appointed at last session to examine the roads in the Beaver river valley—Carried.

Muir—Thompson—That the fee chargeable for use of the town hall due by Flesherton band, viz., \$6, be rebated, less caretaker's fee for attendance, viz., \$2—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That Peter Munshaw's offer to remove timber off deviation through lots 23, 24 and 25, concession 9, known as Flesher's deviation, be accepted, he to pile all brush on extreme points of road allowance and grub out everything 18 feet clear in centre of road, the said work to be done and timber removed not later than March 1st, 1901.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That the offer of two dollars by George Pedlar for all timber on Kinburn St., Eugenia, be accepted, said timber to be removed before December 1st, 1900, and he not to interfere with any private interests in removing the same.—Carried.

Kells—Boyd—That Thos. Crowe, Mrs. Gilliland and Hiram Bowerman be notified and required to remove all obstacles by way of fences or otherwise placed or held by them respectively on Cardigan, Kinburn and East streets in the town plot of Eugenia, in order that the ratepayers may have the use of said streets to the Beaver river.—Carried.

Kells—Muir—That in reference to the application of Nelson Watson and others regarding the formation of a union school with Euphrasia and school section No. 14, Artemesia, the said application to lie on the table until next session until further information is forthcoming in order that this council may act intelligently in the matter.

Kells—Muir—That the first meeting of the Court of Revision on the assessment of 1900 be held at the town hall Flesherton, on Saturday, the second day of June, 1900, the clerk to give the necessary notice.—Carried.

Council adjourned until the 2nd day of June, 1900, after the Court of Rev.

After the meeting the citizens treated our township fathers to a splendid banquet at the Munshaw house, which passed off most pleasantly. Our reporter sends us a full report of the function, which owing to its length, has been held over for next week.—Advance.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The Council met April 16th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows:—From R E English and others praying for a change of pathmaster in division No. 78, C W Rutledge and Wm Irwin accounts for printing De Ego relative to school money; S J Parker notice of a government lot sold; Barrwick Aylesworth and Wright relative to Boyce deviation; Alex J Black declining to act as pathmaster.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That George Filby be appointed pathmaster in place of Alex J Black, he declining to act. Carried.

McInnis—Arrowsmith—That lots 9 and 10 in 18th con be taken from road division No 78 and added to road division No 74 and that Neil Livingstone be pathmaster in division No 78 instead of Joseph Spoule. Carried.

Firth—McInnis—That James Burt be paid \$1.45 half cost of repairing bridge on Garafaxa road south of Durham for 1899. Carried.

McCannel—Arrowsmith—That the School Board of Markdale be paid the sum of \$120 in anticipation of their school levy for 1900 as per R. S. O. Chap 292 Sect 67 (3) Carried.

McCannel—Firth—That Wm Irwin of the "Chronicle" be paid for printing and advertising the sum of \$32.35. Carried.

Firth—McInnis—That John McKechnie of the Durham mills be paid the sum of \$1.80 for 100 lbs flour for Mrs Dillon. Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That this Council pay no more than 3c per load for gravel to be certified by the pathmaster requiring the same, and that the pathmasters are hereby requested to use the gravel in the hills on the road whenever practicable. Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That on account of some of the ratepayers complaining of irregularities in the account of the Commissioner for ward 4 for 1899 and after an examination of the cheques we find the said Commissioner owes this township the sum of \$4.70 and the Clerk is hereby instructed to request the said commissioner to settle this account forthwith. Carried.

Arrowsmith—McCannel—That the Clerk be paid \$30 on Salary. Carried.

Firth—McCannel—That A Bell be paid \$25 on Salary as assessor. Carried.

Arrowsmith—Firth—That the Clerk be paid \$1 express charges and \$1.27 for postage. Carried.

The Council adjourned until notified for Court of Revision.
