## Teachers Assemble in Flesherton.

The Conventions of the Teachers' Association of S. Grey are events of no small importance to the community. To the large and too-little-appreciated class of teachers, the two days are should be bright days of fraternal association and mutual improvement. The average citizen takes note of the two days because troops of youngsters are let loose at uncommon times, and possibly there yet exists the trustee who grows at the loss of time in school especially as "they are off plottin' how to raise salaries."

This year, Friday and Saturday were chosen, and the selection of the standing holiday may have been the cause of a slightly reduced attendance, a few over 70 reporting only. The interest taken by these however was most commendable, seeing that much of the program was idealistic rather than practical, as Chairman Slaughter said "it was an ideal programme."

The specialist present was Mr. Embury, Insp. of Public Schools, Peel Co. whose topics were "English Literature" and "Reading," in the day Session, and "Educational Forces" in the evening. Mr. Embury is a forceful speaker with an earnest, impressive manner, and though his matter would be excellent to peruse at leisure, it seemed to many too heavy for the practical necessities of a body of young teachers met in Convention. If Mr. Embury with his oratorical abilities could infuse into his matter a snice of humor it would be very much more effective. As we saw several note books in operation we have no doubt many valuable hints have been taken home.

W. H. Jenkins, B. A., Prin. O. S. Coll. Inst., spoke on "National Ideals in Education" illustrating from Greece, Rome, Modern Germany and France &c. Mr. H. H. Burgess, B. A., also of the O. Sound staff, spoke on "History" and otherwise assisted, while of the local men taking part we may mention D. Currie, Swinton Park, the new President, J. H. Coleridge, Drumore, Prin. Allan, Durham, W. P. Rogers, Cedarville, F. S. Sine, W. J. Blakeston, Priceville, Miss A. M. Heibin and Miss A. Ley. As usual Inspector Campbell gave the marked assistance in debate which comes from his experience in Public School and Inspectorial work.

The Association passed a resolution recommending that a new device for the Canadian flag be adopted, and that it be a maple leaf placed on the red field of the Union Jack.

The officers for 1900-01 are: Pres., D. Currie, Vice Pres., Miss Annie McKenzie, Durham, Sec'y Treas., T. Allan Durham, Delegate to Educational Association, J. W. Brown Hanover, Committee of five: Mrs. Boddly, Miss M. Scott, and Messrs. J. H. Coleridge, Drumore, W. J. Sharp, Holstein and W. J. Blakeston, Priceville.

Not the least important work done there was the discussions and action on resolutions set down by the Provincial body for consideration. These were handed to a committee who brought in a report. Amongst the changes recommended are: 2) to be minimum age for granting certificates. This was passed with the rider "as soon as practicable." 3) That the training in Model School be extended to one year. Not recommended. 4) That graduates of School of Pedagogy who have not been trained at a Model or Normal School be not allowed to teach in Public Schools. It was surprising to see differences of opinion on this. Another expressed regret that Latin was made compulsory for Junior and Senior Leaving Certificates. Others looked to giving teachers better representation on the Educational Council, certain changes in history as a subject for examination, laying down pretty severe qualifications for Inspector, approving of a movement for better spelling, raising the age of entrance to Public Schools from 5 years to 6, giving Public School teachers prominence in preparing public school text books, and so on, all intended to conserve the interests of the profession on common sense lines and the betterment of the schools.

Out of the 24 suggested changes, No. 9 will, we believe have the most far-reaching effect in bettering the condition of rural school teachers. It recommends that the Legislative Grant should not be apportioned, as at present on a basis of average attendance alone but that the basis be threefold: a) Building and equipments, b) Average attendance, c) Amount of salary paid teachers. This has been an ideal long looked forward to by many, and will "head off" the cut-throat teacher, who while offering himself or herself at a small salary will carry a lessened grant along with him.

Flesherton village and people were as cordial as ever. Its romantic streets, not held down by straight lines, glimpses of water and woodland, give it a charm of its own, while its churches, residences and business places seem fresh and fair.

The evening concert was a brilliant affair, for in addition to Mr. Embury there was Miss Annie Richardson, Mrs. Blackburn, Miss Christie, Mrs. Shepard and others. The managers however, came out of it glumly being \$20 out of pocket, the unexpected expense of local talent being heavy for a 15c admission.
