### THE WAR SITUATION.

The steady onward march of the British troops has been continued throughout the week. Lord Roberts, we learn on Monday night having crossed the Vaal river without apparently a shot having been fired since leaving Kroonstad.

A check was experienced last week when about 60 of Bethune's Horse were killed or captured in an ambush. Another piece of careless or no scouting.

Gen. Baden-Powell has increased the respect held for him by declining to come home and rest, as urged by his friends, but will remain in command, and see the end of it.

British troops were just in time across the Vaal to save the coal mines from destruction. At this writing it is not known whether the great Johannesburg mines are safe or not, but a Cape Town despatch says French has entered Johannesburg, and if this be true, the mines may be safe.

The Free State is almost entirely free of fighting men, and Kruger and the Transvaal Boers, now that the war is in their own country, are, it is reported giving thoughts to peace. Especially since the mission of the three delegates to the States is a failure.

A general round up seems to be taking place and the war may end any day. A train with engine at full steam stands in Pretoria ready to carry off Kruger. Gen. Botha, seems to be a sensible and humane General. He is reported to be urging surrender.

Panic reigns in the Transvaal and trains laden with refugees are leaving Pretoria Commandos here and there are singing "God save the Queen" and cant be stopped and possibly the last shot has been fired.

The coroner Dr Jones was notified but an inquest was not deemed necessary. He was buried in Barber's cemetery on Saturday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Livingston of Mt. Forest spent the 24th with the latter's parents.

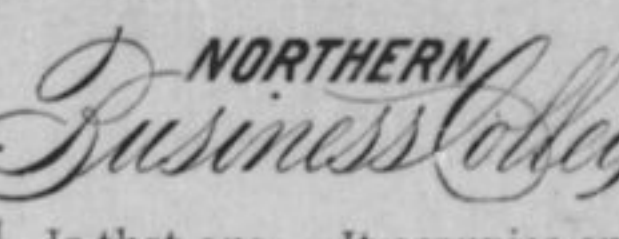
