DEATH OF REV. J. EDGE.

Rev. Jos. Edge, President of the London Conference and pastor of Wellington Street Methodist Church, died this morning from the effects of tubercular meningitis, followed by pleurisy. Mr. Edge was much beloved by the church over which he had been pastor for two years. His loss will also be deeply felt by the denomination in this section of the Province, as his skillful administration, untiring devotion and large-heartedness made him a most valuable member of the church at large and of the community in which he lived. The Rev. gentleman's illness dates from last fall, when he overtaxed himself by indulging in a winter trip from London to Goderich. Deceased was born in Glenelg, Grey County, in 1832, and in 1876, at the age of twenty-four, entered the probationary period of service in the Methodist ministry. After spending two years at Arkwright and one year at Chesley he attended the Wesleyan Theological College at Montreal for two years. In 1881, in Brampton, he was ordained under the Presidency of the late Rev. J. G. Laird. Since then he had served in the pastorates of Paisley, Clinton, Acton and Goderich, spending three years in each. In his last charge, Wellington St., London, he has served for the past two years. The year after his ordination the Rev. Mr. Edge married Miss Elizabeth Taylor, daughter of Mr. Hugh Taylor, of Owen Sound, and their union was blessed with one son and two daughters. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the Wellington St. Methodist church at 4.30. Thence the remains will be taken to the Grand Trunk station to await the arrival of the 6.20 express, when they will be conveyed to Owen Sound for interment.—Globe.

BENTINCK COUNCIL.

The Bentinck Council met as a Court of Revision at Allan Park, on Monday, the 28th day of May last. Members being all present, made and subscribed the oath of office. On motion, the reeve was appointed chairman of the Court.

The following appeals were heard: Geo Kenny, assessment, confirmed; John McDougall, lot 28, con 9, assessment reduced, \$50; Robert and Oliver McCaslin, assessment reduced, \$100; Robert Leslie, appeal withdrawn; Geo. Mighton, lots 49 and 50, con 2, W. G. R., assessment placed at \$1,900.

There being no further business before the Court adjourned and Council met for the transaction of general business.

On motion, the roll was ordered to be received from the assessor, and his salary of \$80 paid him.

The committee appointed to adjust and make settlement with the Council of Hanover reported that all matters between the two corporations had been settled on a basis of paying the village of Hanover \$100.52, in full of all claims against the township.

The reeve reported contract for a new bridge on Skene's side road let to Mr. McIntosh for \$135, to be finished by 15th July. Approaches to Aberdeen bridge as completed, cost \$13.25. He further reported that the bridge committee had met with a committee of the Board of Council, at the Crispin bridge on the town line, but that no action had been taken by their committee in the matter.

Mr. Adlam reported the following expenditure in division No 2:—James Past, \$1.50, half cost of culvert on Garraux road; John Aldred, \$4.50, half cost of work on town line, B. and N.

Mr Brown reported as follows:—\$50 to Jacklin and McMahon, for work on Durham road, at lot 15, Rowland & Hurrell, \$4.25, work on Neustad road; Wm Bailey, \$1.25, repairs to culvert, con 6, lot 15. Reports ordered to be received and cheques issued.

By-law No. 4, for 1900, dividing the township into 7 polling divisions, having been duly read, was ordered to be passed, signed and sealed.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid:—John Mitchell, \$29.75, printing; Dr Mearns, \$8, for medicine and attendance on the Casement family when sick with diptheria; Jacob Kress \$12, for coffin for Widow Fawcett; Robt Leslie, pathmaster, \$7, non resident statute labor money against lots 12 to 15, con 2, S. D. R.

Council adjourned, to meet at Dorchester, on Monday, the 6th day of August next.
