THE WAR SITUATION.

Our celebrations were all right, but the Boers this week have their turn. Lord Roberts' communications are cut near Kroonstadt 40 miles of railroad destroyed, the British force defending it overpowered and 600 or 700 killed or captured. A few days ago east of the railroad, a force, composed chiefly of English aristocrats numbering 500, was also captured.

Butler is making progress however, and—the joke of it—he may yet relieve Roberts who is at present cut off from 6 or 7 of his divisions. Hunter from Mafeking, is doing good work and may soon reach Roberts.

Kitchener will now have a chance to show to the full of his mystic power. The situation though critical is not alarming.

3651 British prisoners were set free by Lord Roberts. The Boers got off with 900.

There is a report that the Municipal Council is taking the matter up and will present the guilty parties as for the truth of it we cannot say, but we know that a few years ago when the Bell Telephone Company was running a line along the east boundary line of this township and cut some trees to get their wire up, the Proton Council of that day took up the case and entered a law suit against the Company, now if our Township Council was doing right then to go to Law for the Company cutting trees to leave room for their wire, surely they are justified in entering suit against parties who wilfully destroy ornamental trees planted out on the road side at the residence of ratepayers.

Our Councillor is out letting road jobs and the people are talking to do their statute labor. The talk is of making considerable improvements on the road.

A man in our township was enlarging his cellar and wheeled out the dirt and some large stones that were in it onto the road and a neighbor opposite complained to the Councillor that the stones were injurious to the travelling public and should be removed, so the Councillor notified him to remove them which he did by throwing them at the opposite side of the road against the man's fence who complained against him, but this did not suit the second man and he went and carried across the road again to the man's door where they first came from. The result was that these stones were carried across the road several times before they could find a resting place, much to the amusement of the neighbors.

GLENELG COURT OF REVISION.

The Court of Revision for Tp. of Glenelg met May 20th. All the members present. Members having been sworn. Mr Jas Staples was voted to the chair. Changes were made in the Assessment Roll as amended as follows:

Amos Chislett, appeal dismissed; McCullough and Young entered for lots 16 and 17 con 15; J A McMillan, entered for lot 36 con 3 N D R; Neil Black, entered for lot 36 con 2 N D R; Joseph Williams, entered for lot 50 con 3 E G R; Geo Hendricks and W H Arrow-smith, entered for lot 19 con 5; Jno J Young, entered for pt lot 50 con 2 E G R; Allan Bell, entered for lot 3 of 7 con 1 E G R; Allan Boyd, entered for lot 20 con 2 E G R; Hugh McDonald, entered for lot 14 con 3 E G R; Dan Wilkie, entered for lot 1 of 8 con 1 E G R; George McKechnie, entered for lots 9 and 10 con 1 N D R; Neil McCannell, entered for lot 22 con 4 S D R; Joseph Neil, entered for lot 15 con 5; Albert Neil, entered for lot 14 con 5; Dan McKinnon, entered for lot 21 con 4 N D R.

The assessment Roll as so amended was finally passed and the Court rose. After Court of Revision the Council met for general business. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Arrow-smith—McInnis—That James McFadden be appointed pathmaster in division 80 instead of John McFadden. Carried.

McInnis—Firth—That Peter Hill be pathmaster in division 9 instead of Wm Hill, also Thos Moran to be pathmaster in division No 77 instead of Richard Moran. Carried.

Firth—Arrow-smith—That \$150 be granted to improve Lambton Street, Also \$200 to repair the 10th concession. Carried.

McInnis—McInnes—That the Commissioner for ward 4 be granted \$30 to gravel crossway at lot 7 con 10. Also that Commissioner for ward 2 be granted the sum of \$50 to repair roads at lots 32 and 33 con 2 N D R. Carried.

McInnis—Arrow-smith—That the sum of \$100 for each ward as ward appropriation be granted and that there be no Specials granted without the consent of this Council in session. Carried.

McInnis—Firth—That the Assessment Roll as Revised by the Court of Revision be the Roll for the year 1900 and that the Clerk certify to the same and that the Assessor be paid \$25 being balance of his salary. Carried.

McInnis—McInnis—That the Treasurer is hereby instructed to receive from John Williams the sum of \$4.70 which he offers to refund to the Township on account of Overdrawn money for year 1899. Carried.

Firth—McInnis—That the Assessor be paid \$7 for equalizing 2 School Sections viz. No 10 G, and E, and Durham, Bentinck and Glenelg. Carried.

Cheques were issued as follows: The Municipal World, Collectors supplies, &c. \$5.71; Dom. Express charges 50 cts; County Treasurer, tax deeds \$2; Thos Lander, Reg. of deeds \$2; John McCann rep. of floating bridges G, and H, 1/2 cost \$2. The Council adjourned to July 9th at 10 a. m. J. S. Black, Clerk.
