Toronto Farmers' Market. Wheat, eastern: 600 bushels sold as follows: white, 200 bushels at 98 to 99c; red, 400 bushels at 66 1/2 to 67c; coarse, 200 bushels at 70 to 71c.

Ontario Wheat Inspection. At a meeting of the Montreal Corn Exchange the question of inspection of Ontario wheat was considered. The Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways jointly acknowledged the committee's letters in reply.

Cheese Markets. Lindsay, June 4.—The first cheese meeting of the Victoria and Haliburton Counties Board for 1900 was held here to-day.

Stirling, Ont., June 6.—At our Cheese Board to-day, 17 factories boarded their clover colored; highest bid, 9 5/8c; 555 sold.

Napanee, Ont., June 6.—At the Cheese Board here to-day there were 1,067 white and 815 colored boarded; 250 sold at 3 1/2c and balance at 9 5/8c.

Bradstreet's on Trade. Trade at Montreal is getting into better swing for the movement of mid-summer goods which have been slow owing to unfavorable weather.

Seeds. In Toledo October clover closed 15c higher at \$5.50 per bushel bid, and old prime 5c higher at \$4.90 bid.

Trade at Vancouver and other Coast points is being retarded to some extent by the elections, but business is improving. Winnipeg trade reports are of a satisfactory character.
