

OUR COUNTY IN SESSION

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.
Continued from Supplement.
Rep. No. 1 Co. Prop. Com. Recommended payment of:
Telephone Co. 75c. Parker & Co. Sundries \$8.85.

Wm. Totten, Chairman, was instructed to get the following repairs done as cheaply and efficiently as possible.

The repairs consisted of painting and repairing windows, roof, flooring, etc., of County buildings. A verandah costing \$465.50 had been placed at Court House.

Rep. No. 1, R & B Com, recommended the adoption of report of a joint committee appointed by Co. Councils of Grey and Bruce re the Crispin bridge. This promised County help when the municipalities of Bentinck and Brant passed the necessary by-laws establishing the deviations. They also recommended the deviation to be on the east side of boundary line.

McColman & Preston be appointed to attend to repairs asked for Thornbury bridge.

A number of acts were recommended to be paid which are noted "passed" elsewhere.

Report of Fin. Com. No. 2 recommended payment of several acts which are noted "passed" elsewhere. The Bank statements were filed. In the Merchant Bank there is \$11673.37 to the credit of the County. In Moisson's Bank \$10519.00.

Application of Chas. H. Dixon to resign appointment as County student "Not entertained."

Report No. 2 Co. Prop. Com. recommended payment of several acts which have been noted "passed" elsewhere. The report went on:

In compliance with Judge Cressor's letter your committee recommend that a scarlet Merino flag be purchased for County Buildings.

Your Committee has had before them the tender of John Wedrick for granite lithic walks to County Building amounting to \$195.00. (The specification provide for the usual details of construction.)

Chairman was empowered to get repairs to the Judge's chambers at an early date.

W. E. Johnston was awarded contract for wood at \$3.15 a cord.

(Several small acts of councilmen inspection and mileage re County Building repairs amounting to \$29.10 were ordered paid.)

Warden presented Act for \$1 from Miss McCaul, type writing engineer's report re Crispin bridge.

Warden read invitation from Mayor Laidlaw to attend a garden party at Aberdeen in the evening.

Rep. No. 1 Printing Com. was presented by Mr. Schenck. Adopted.

A NOTED PAPER.

The Toronto Daily Star has introduced into Canada a feature which is as novel as it is conspicuous in connection with newspaper advertising. It prints a line in red ink every day across the top of the page advertisement of one of their large advertisers. The marvel of its readers is as to how the thing is done. At the same time it prints special announcements of its own upon the front page of its paper from time to time also in colored ink, sometimes printing a paragraph at the bottom of one of the columns of the front page, and occasionally strengthening its front page cartoon with some colored ink. As an illustration of this latter upon the day that it was announced that Pretoria had been taken by General Roberts, the Star printed a cartoon showing "Bobs" with a brush in his hand "painting the map of South Africa a British Red," painting it from ocean to ocean, as in geographies hereafter, that part of the world will be colored. It was one of the most striking bits of newspaper work ever produced in Canada or elsewhere. More recently, an adaptation of Sam Hunter, the cartoonist, of the celebrated picture "What we have hold," represented General Roberts as a British Bulldog standing upon the Map of South Africa shown in the form of a British flag, which was brightened and strengthened by a red cross worked into the folds of the flag by this wonderful Star color process. As an up-to-date newspaper, the Toronto Daily Star eclipses all its rivals. It is dignified without being heavy, bright without being flippant, aggressive without being ill-natured.
