

IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The Chinese embargo has diverted attention from Africa, but when we read that from June 5 to July 5 there were 8000 casualties, including 1200 deaths, we are brought face to face with a serious reality.

Buller and Roberts have at last met on Saturday and had a conference. Pretoria is still the head quarters of Gen. Roberts, though his main army is still pressing eastward, causing a change in the moving Boer Capital from time to time though with no very decisive results.

Interest centres largely in the Free State where Steyn is "putting up" a fight which is taxing the British to overcome. Within a quadrilateral formed by Harrismith, Bethlehem, Vreeds and Frankfort, the Free Staters have shown splendid tactics, but the British having captured Frankfort, one may soon expect a round-up of the forces of Steyn and De Wet. Kruger is a grasping mercenary, on whom all sentiment is lost, over \$4,000,000 arrived in Holland a few days ago from the Transvaal government, which really means Kruger and perhaps Reitz.

The Boers made an unsuccessful attempt to capture Buller and his escort while returning from his visit to Lord Roberts.

The Strathconas have been in action several times and always came out with credit and few losses.
