

A Hospital For Poor Consumptives.

An Association Formed To Aid In Its Maintenance

The meeting held in the Town Hall Tuesday evening the 24th inst., though not very largely attended, resulted in the formation of a local Association as above indicated. Inspector Campbell was, on motion duly seconded, called to the chair, and opened the meeting with a very appropriate and interesting speech, remarking upon the worthiness of effort put forth for the cure of Consumption, upon the bereavement resulting so frequently from this fell disease; the need for education of the public generally as to contagion and prevention; the compulsion of P. S. Inspectors, at the present time to insist upon cleanliness in schools; and the success attending the German plan of treating Consumption. Mr. Watson, the gentleman representing National Sanitarium Association of Canada, being introduced, gave a statement covering the organization and incorporation of said Association, and gave the names several of the worthy men in it and as a guarantee that it can be relied on to carry out all it has undertaken.

The Muskoka Hospital put in operation over two years ago, has resulted in a large number of relative and entire cures of pulmonary tuberculosis, and better results still are looked for with increased experience.

To the poor consumptives, however, unable to pay the charges, its doors have been necessarily closed. For this class—the poor consumptives—some provision is now to be made. An Hospital is in course of erection in Muskoka which will be given up entirely to the care and treatment of the consumptive poor, and to aid in its continued maintenance, local associations are being formed at the principal business centres of the province.

Already such Associations have been formed at many points. Such local Associations it is believed may be of service in the different communities in a variety of ways. They may do good Educational work in teaching as to the curability, the contagion and the prevention of Consumption; they may serve a good purpose in recommending the worthy poor in each locality for free treatment at the poor Consumptives' Hospital in Muskoka, and they may regularly and systematically look after contributions, year after year, towards the maintenance of that institution.

By an act of the Legislature of Ontario, support of the Hospital for poor Consumptives to the extent of \$1.50 per week per patient will be given, all beyond that must come from the people's contributions.

On motion of Dr. Gun, seconded by Rev. Mr. Farquharson a local Association was formed upon the plan suggested and provisional officers and Executive Committee were appointed as follows:

who, together with the ministers of the different churches, and a lady and gentleman from each church will constitute the Executive. A meeting of this Committee will be held at an early date in order to complete the work of organization.

Mr. Watson reports that everywhere he has been on his tour of organization there are many people desirous of being helped in this and we doubt not the same will prove to be the state of things here, and that Durham will show herself equal to other towns in taking hold of this certainly worthy enterprise.

Fine weather and light winds prevail throughout the Dominion, and the probabilities are that these may continue for a little while longer.

IN CHINA.

The situation is still shrouded in a multitude of despatches the warp and woof of which seems to be the texture of lies. One ray of light only has come from Perkin, but it has served only to make darkness more visible and is treated as a "will o' the wisp."

It is this. The United States insisted that Wu, Chinese minister in Washington, should put them in communication with their minister in Pekin.—Conger. A cypher despatch was sent, and in a few days a despatch from Conger was received, written in the same cypher; "In British Legation: under continued shot and shell from Chinese troops. Quick relief only can prevent general massacre."

This was updated but it is understood it was sent July 18, and the mystery lies in the other despatches sent same or next day, by Chinese officials that the various ministers in Pekin are well and the proper Chinese authorities are devising measures for their rescue and protection.

The urgency of the one and the calmness of the other have roused doubts which will not down that the first though genuine was sent out about July 1st, and intercepted, but to gain time was sent to gratify the Americans. Any way Europe does not believe in it.

A curious move is that of Li Hung Chang, Vice Roy of the Province in which is Canton. A message from Pekin orders him there to take charge of affairs, and though urged and besieged by foreigners and business Chinese of Canton not to go, he did. Landed at Shanghai, received somewhat coldly, on he went again and will be passing through near the allied forces, who yearningly look, but dare not yet move to Pekin. If this old man can get through with his suite, the powers should insist on going with him, making him a hostage.

Russian territory on the north has been invaded and sharp fighting has taken place, forcing Russia to act alone and she has virtually declared war and is mobilizing a huge army.

Britain has restricted the sale of munitions of war to China.

Tuesday's papers do not settle the matter yet. True, the Chinese agent asserts that the envoys are to leave Pekin and be sent to Tien-Tsin. The Americans are bound to accept Conger's despatch as truth till they know better. Europa still disbelieves the story of their safety.

The Chinese government has issued an edict calling upon all their governors, &c., to defend foreigners and laying the blame of the troubles on the missionaries. It is extremely well written.

IN AFRICA.

Gen. De Wet, so far from being cornered up in the Free State, has slipped through the cordon, cut the railway and telegraph lines, seized a supply train, and taken prisoner 100 Kilties. Until Lord Roberts gets moving him self we are still to hear of Boer successes.

Methuen is winning some victories in the Transvaal but nothing very decisive. More Canadians are being invaded home. The Strathconas are meeting with casualties but so far, happily the name of Ledingham does not appear.

The death of Lient Borden the brave and only son of the Minister of Militia has caused wide comment and roused much sympathy.

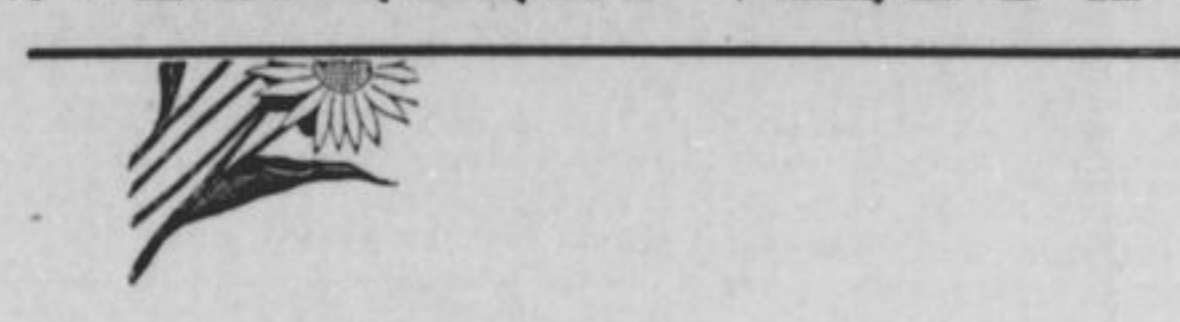
