WOMEN COMMIT SUICIDE. Wife of Dr. Hutton, of Fort Rouge, Shoots Herself. MRS. LIPKE CUTS HER THROAT.

A Winnipeg report says: Mrs. Hutton, wife of Dr. W. A. B. Hutton, committed suicide by shooting herself through the head with a revolver at their residence, Mayfair avenue, Fort Rouge, at 2:15 this afternoon.

A similar tragedy occurred at Neepawa, this morning, when Mrs. Lipke died as a result of cutting her throat.
