ECHOES OF THE PICNIC.

GIBSON AND FRASER.

Mr. Gibson, M. P., Lincoln is one of the best stump speakers in Ontario and he is ever willing to visit his friend Landerkin at any time. He had come 700 miles to be present at the picnic in honor of his seat mate at Ottawa, and being so close to him he could testify to his ability and worth as a member of the House. It has been said he had lost money, if so he was sure he had retained his friends and he was pleased once more to see part of the band of men who had stood so nobly by him.

Sir Hibbert Tupper in 1896 gave the Liberal government 6 mos. in power, they have now been in over 4 years, with what result? In 1895 Mr. Foster at Toronto was trying to prove by figures that the country was prosperous and Laurier said when we come to power you will not need figures to prove your prosperity you put your hand in your pocket and you feel it. This Mr. Gibson asserted was true.

The so called 'deal' or 'steal' in the Drummond railway affair was something to be proud of. The receipts in the best year before 1898 were only \$3 millions, now notwithstanding the cost of the railway, the receipts were \$4 millions: enough of excess to pay for the railway in one year while the equipment was better.

The great difference in the granting of subsidies then and now was very clearly brought out. Subsidies to railways were still given, but instead of making it a pure gift with no guarantee as in the past, the subsidy was now chargeable with 3 per cent, and as the railways carry mails, the 3 per cent is deducted from their earnings for this purpose.

Duncan Fraser M. P. of Guysboro, N. S. had also great pleasure in being present at a meeting to honor his friend Dr. Landerkin. He brought with him the greetings of the Laurierites of the Maritime provinces to his friend and his supporters. The Dr. had studied Canadian politics and the speaker could testify to the value of his work not only in committees but to the fact that Dr. Landerkin was consulted and enquired after. In honoring Dr. Landerkin they were honoring themselves.

We had fallen on strange times when a party who had been tried and found wanting, wanted reinstatement with the evils that caused their defeat still unremedied. The question simply meant the turning out of men who have proved themselves fit for men who have proved themselves quite unfit.

Sir Chas Tupper's party, finding him unfit and a back number had introduced Hugh John Macdonald to galvanize the party into life. Tupper himself would be unable to secure an audience and the speaker displayed an original copy of an opera company's bill in Nova Scotia where Sir Chas. was set out as an attraction at the close of the variety show, it being announced that tickets for the show would enable the holder to remain for the lecture without extra charge.

He appealed to them personally if the change for the better was not marked, better even than Mr. Mulock's figure, good as they were. Coal is dearer by 60 per cent, yet every factory is busy, new ones going up, and wages being voluntarily increased. They were either ignorant or liars when they said the Liberal would ruin the country for even they must admit the country was prosperous.

Conservatives effected to sneer at the tariff reductions as inconsequential. An average reduction of 12 per cent had been made but taking 10 per cent he gave a graphic illustration of its value in an ordinary farmer's transactions. His story of Brown and Jones was also graphic. Brown as foreman year by year reported deficits, till at last the proprietor made a change. Jones arrested the deficit the first year, and each succeeding year although developing the property admirably had handsome surpluses. Brown after 4 years wants to try his hand again. Will the proprietor be likely to turn Jones off? Not more likely than Canada will turn out a progressive Liberal government for a party divided in their councils and of proved incapacity.

The Post Office department under Mr. Mulock runs over 2 million miles more in a year now than before, a better service is rendered, 2 cts in place of 3 cts at home and 2 cts in place of 5 cts abroad, yet his deficits are not half what they were before, will soon disappear entirely and would be big surpluses were there still a 3c rate.

Every true Canadian should be proud of this government. In three years not one cent of its expenditure has been challenged by Tupper or his party. Prospero's wand had touched Canada with the advent of the Liberals to power and in the increase of her trade Canada in the last four years had passed the record of all nations.

Yet you are asked to turn out this government, to turn out the man who has given the best measure of his manhood in your service. Nothing should prevent you giving him a greater majority than ever. They would send more from the maritime provinces and every man and woman should feel they were joining in the triumphal march of the motherland, and we, as never before were contributing to the glory of the empire.

Dr. Landerkin, said the speaker, was the medicine chest of the party at Ottawa by his sunny smile, his good judgment and his wise counsel. He would go further if necessary to show his respect for him and the most cheering news he could receive on election night would be that the government was sustained and that Dr. Landerkin was elected by an increased majority.

Mr. Fraser was, as usual, eloquent and was warmly applauded.

Live Stock Market.

Toronto.

The receipts at the western cattle yards to-day were 65 car loads of live stock, including 2,150 hogs, 2000 sheep and lambs, 900 cattle, 50 calves, and a few milch cows.

The market was all around practically unchanged.

We had scarcely any movement in shipping cattle, and \$4.90 was the best price paid.

Sheep are unchanged at from 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 per pound. All here sold.

Lambs are not notably changed, but for any but the best prices were inclined to weaken.

Bucks are worth from 2 1/2 to 3c per lb.

The prime hogs (singers) are worth 6 1/2c per lb.
Sows are worth 8 1/2c per lb, and stags 2c per lb.
For fat and light hogs the outside price was 5 1/2c per lb.
Hogs to fetch the top price must be of prime quality, and scale not below 160 nor above 200 lbs.
