NOTES.
12 a. m.—Glorious weather assures
the success of the Show of 1900. The
hotel stables and streets adjoining are
packed full of horses and vehicles,
while the tables are surrounded by
hundreds who come for dinner. The
ladies in the Town Hall had a fine sup-
per and many willing hands waited
defly.

The Poultry exhibit is the best that
any local show within 50 miles can pro-
duce. But it is not up to last year in
quantity. Judge Wright spent Wed-
nesday forenoon in judging the many
fine specimens. There are about 143
birds in all including 8 geese and a doz-
en turkeys. Otto Knapp is an ambi-
tious young breeder in the poultry line
and takes 8 firsts and 2 seconds on 11
entries.

SHEEP.
We have seen more pens occupied,
but the Leicester has seldom been
better. Wm. Herd runs away with 7
firsts in this class, and with 5 firsts in
Walkerton, and 6 in Neustadt, he will be
able to patch his house 1st.

A P Muir from Ceylon are pub-
lic-sited exhibitors from Ceylon and are
working into the Cotswold breed with
some fine specimens.

CATTLE.
F Reiner, Neustadt, is an exhibitor
faithful from year to year, and takes
delight in his Durhams. The prize list
will show his wins. His first prize cow
is his own raising. A fat cow of Park-
er's is a sight with the fat shaking in
the ribs. A. S. Hunter's Herefords were
fine animals.

The poor pigs! Can the Directors not
have a well dug near by? In such hot
weather it is cruelty to animals to pen
