A Record Breaker in Attendance.

Splendid weather on both days, Thursday and Friday of last week, made the success of this fine local show, a certainty and the deferred date, allowing threshings and fall work to be well advanced, left everyone free to enjoy a good day and a big crowd, and they did it.

The inside had a tasty and full appearance, the roots surpassing in the opinion of many any of the shows that are past. Of course they have had longer to grow, but the potatoes in size and quantity were something great. Fruit is not up in quantity to some past years. The squashes were the biggest we have seen this year, and other similar vegetables were up to the mark.

Harness-maker Watson had a fine exhibit of harness, and so there was without opposition. Dugald McLean has seen the century out after having been turning out fine and well-made boots and shoes for about 60 years. During his stay in Priceville, 5 shoemakers have come and gone but his eye and hand are still good for fine work.

Outside are two fine exhibits of buggies, &c., from the two Flesherton Makers McFavish and Heard. Both were honored with red tickets, and they deserve the thanks of the society for their presence and public spirit.

There was keen competition in many of the horse classes, and the number of fine spring colts caught our eye as never before. The exhilarating day had its effect on the drivers who were sometimes very reckless in speeding.

Jno. Fairbairn, with his 2000 lb Bull earned its 3rd red ticket this year, and he had other cattle, &c., which won 1st prizes as well as seen. A 1-yr old bull of Donald McMillan's is a thrifty specimen that will make its mark yet.

The sheep were a fine lot, and for a young exhibitor the pen of Leicesters shown by Thos Nichol was altogether creditable. D. Harrow, A. & J. Sealey and the Muirs had also good pens.

Porkers were good though as a matter of display a failure, some being in waggons and some on the ground.

The crowd was very large, good humored and went home satisfied. The booths did a good trade, and Dominic Blakeston in stentorian tones invited the crowd up or throw their money up. The funds of the Epworth League will be increased by a good round sum by their efforts.

THE CONCERT.

Never we think was Watson's hall better filled with a more appreciative audience than faced Chairman Dr Hut-

ton about 8 p. m. The presence of the candidates had a drawing effect and the splendid weather and good feeling over a good show added to the brilliant musical talent engaged, did the rest.

Dr. Hutton opened with a few appropriate remarks and was a model chairman. The Haw bros. gave excellent and lively music as they only can do. Mrs. Wright, Markdale, an old favorite here sang at intervals, showing a voice of great compass under splendid control, while Miss Jean Renwick appeared before a Priceville audience for the first time charming all by her clear enunciation and sweet musical naturalness.

Dr. Landerkin and Mr. M. Richardson did not sing. The latter was called on first, had a good reception and made a nice speech. He flattered Scotchmen and referred to the steady growth and advancement in Agricultural pursuits, as witnessed by successful shows, &c. Above all this the war had shown that Canada had produced "men" as her greatest product.

Dr. Landerkin was received with great warmth, and in a reminiscent mood recalled early experiences in staging through Priceville and roughing it in 1808. He generally in the good old times of 30 odd years ago. The wonderful growth and expansion of the country since then in every material and mental interest was very ably set forth.

Both speakers steered off politics, but all joined heartily in God save the Queen.

Live Stock Market.

Toronto.
Receipts heavy.
Trade quiet in some lines, but general dullness still.
Prices are practically unchanged.
Exporters sold at good prices for a lot of fancy stock.
Trade in butchers' only fair.
Export bulls quiet.
Feeders steady.
Stockers active.
Milch cows dull.
Sheep and lambs firm.

Hogs were dear for choice.
The market was comparatively slow, as far as good business was concerned. There was a large run, 78 loads, including about 1,000 cattle, 1,500 sheep and lambs and 25 calves. There were about 3,000 hogs, but several carloads of these were billed to firms in the city, and those on the market numbered about 2,000. Stock moved rather quickly and there was very little left over.

Butchers' Cattle—A good many were sold, but prices showed no improvement. They ranged from \$3.20 to \$4.40 per cwt. The demand for good quality beasts was keen and prices were firm at \$3.75 to \$4.50 per cwt. Middling to inferior beasts are plentiful, but demand for them is light.

Milch Cows—Trade quiet with small offerings. Good beasts were in demand at \$4.00 to \$5.00 each, and extra choice were worth even more. Sales were made at \$47.50.

Feeders—Receipts fairly large with prices holding their own. Heavy were sold at \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt and light at \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt. Trade showed a little lull and stock was well cleaned up.

Stockers—Active but at low prices. Some light weights were sold at \$3 per cwt but the general price was \$2.50 and sales were even made as low as \$1.75 per cwt for off-color beasts.

Sheep and lambs—Receipts were large demand was good and trade was brisk. Everything was cleaned out and the firmness seems likely to continue. Export ewes were firm at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt, locks a little firmer at \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt and butchers' steady at \$2 to \$3 each. Lambs were steady at \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt and \$2.75 to \$3.50 each. There was an active demand for them and they sold readily.

Hogs—Market still strong and receipts very large. Choice are a trifle higher and are being held at \$6.25 to \$6.37 1/2 per cwt for hogs of 160 to 200 lbs natural weight. Other hogs are firm with prices unchanged. There was talk at the market to-day of a drop in prices next week.

MORE LIGHT NEEDED.

Taking up the arguments of Sir Chas. Tupper & Co. at Collingwood where we left last week, our correspondent gives another like this: "They also said that Mr. Tarte, Minister of Public Works went down to Lower Canada to let a contract of dredging the harbor and he went to a dear friend of his own and said he had a \$30000 contract of dredging the harbour and he wanted him to take it. So his friend said he never saw a dredge. Oh! says Mr. Tarte, that does not matter, you take the contract anyhow and the government will give you \$8 an hour and you can get it done for \$5 an hour. So you see Mr. Tarte's friend got the boodle from the Dominion government for nothing."

We wonder if many believers were found for this bland like story! One of many charged against the able Minister of Public Works on the platform by speakers more or less irresponsible, out who fail completely to bring these charges from their responsible position in the House. Mr. Tarte's conduct of his department will stand the truest light. The system of tendering for public works after due notice is closely followed and not one of his traducers dare stand in his place in parliament and repeat such a story.

Next "They say that in 1898 the Reform Government were going to put the Prohibition bill to completion it the Tories would let them have their swing. Anyway, the bill was put before the electors of the whole Dominion and the bill was voted for by a large majority and then the Reform party did not act as they agreed but they simply spent upwards of Two Million Dollars for nothing and Laurier said to the big bugs, we had better not pass this bill for we will never get any more drinks in the House and now we have it all in our hands to do as we like with it!"

Wonder what the "big bugs" said to this? It is worth mentioning that the House of Commons, with a Reform majority, presided over by this same "drink" loving Laurier abolished the bar in the House of Commons soon after attaining power, but the Senate with a Conservative majority voted to keep them.

Perhaps the "upwards of two million dollars" was a slip of the tongue uttered as Mr. Foster once said "in a moment of weakness." We always thought it was a big sum of money, but like a vast majority of Conservative utterances this sum is over 10 times too big. The amount spent was less than \$200,000, to be exact a reference to the Auditor General's report proves it to have been \$197,927.94 a sum considerably less than what is paid for one sessional indemnity.

"The Reform Party did not act as they agreed." Here is what they agreed in the plank of the Ottawa platform. "That whereas public attention is at present much directed to the consideration of the admittedly great evils of intemperance, it is desirable that the mind of the people should be clearly ascertained on the question of Prohibition by means of a Dominion Plebiscite." The Plebiscite was taken, their pledge was kept, there was a majority of votes, but less than 23 per cent of the people voted for it, a proportion far too small in the minds of many consistent and prominent prohibitionists to warrant the introduction of a summary measure of such great consequence, and especially with one province up in arms against it.

Our friend says "So Mr. Foster closed his remarks by saying that the Reform Party did not do one iota of good in the last four years." Mr. Foster would say that and yet none knows better than he what good has been done. The REVIEW of recent date, in common with many other papers, has had abundant proof of what has been done, our issues of Sep. 13 and 20 being especially full. We hope the brief references we have given will suffice to show, that the Laurier government is worthy of all credit for the statesmanship that has made the trade of Canada advance more in 4 years by about twice the amount of the 18 yrs preceding.
