But the bias of each municipality being known, it suited the party in power to throw in the township most likely to win the riding to their interest.

We have to chronicle this week the death of Mr John McQueen, senior, Egremont who died Nov 14th, last. For the past 7 years he lived at his brother Chas. He reached the years allotted to man being 82 years. He was born in Islay Scotland in 1818. Left home when only 15 years old and worked 4 years in the Lowlands and a few years in New York and Buffalo. He then came to Toronto in 1848 and took up land in Egremont in 1862 the lot now owned by Mr Thos. Knox.

He was married twice, first to Miss Catherine Clark, his second wife was Miss Margaret McKenzie, who died in 1893.

Mr McQueen was a member and Elder in the Presbyterian Church and took an active part in all matters relating to Church work under the Rev. Donald Fraser's ministry. He died in strong faith in his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ exhorting those around him to be also ready for the hour of death. In politics Mr McQueen was a strong Reformer and a great reader of the Globe. He had a wonderful memory and could read all day without glasses. He was buried at Holstein a large number of friends and neighbors following the remains to the grave. Rev. Mr. Matheson officiated both at the house and at the grave. One brother, Charles and one sister in Greenock Scotland, still lives of the family. In the quiet and solitude of his brother's home he had all care and comfort called for in his childless old age. Much credit is due to Mrs Chas. McQueen for her untiring care and devotion to his every wish and in his last day wished that his blessing might be with her.

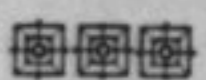
