A SERIOUS ATTACK.

Gosmo Cameron Gudge's Constable Carson White on Duty.

Monday last Mr. C. Cameron, Varney appeared before Mayor Laidlaw, charged with personal abuse of Mr. Carson and illegally resisting him while doing what he considered his duty as an officer of the law.

The trouble grew out of disputes between the defendant and his father as to their standing in relation to each other and the farm. The father claims his son was working for wages, while the son holds there was an arrangement that he was to get the place under certain conditions.

Acting for Mr. Cameron, Sr., Mr. Carson, on Monday of last week went down and seized upon certain articles and put them under lock and key in the old man's possession. The son, not recognizing the validity of this action, subsequently took possession of what he claimed was his own.

This brought Mr. Carson back on Friday last and after a brief altercation he was attacked by the young man with a stick, struck over the head making a cut four inches long and having two of his ribs broken, and believes he was only saved from further injury by the interposition of defendant's father with a double-barrelled gun threatening to shoot him if he struck another blow.

Lawyer Clark of Mt. Forest was defendant's counsel, Mr. J. P. Telford for the plaintiff. The evidence of Mr. Carson was taken in his bedroom. His injuries being sufficient to keep him there for weeks. He avers that he approached defendant civilly and was met by violence the word and the blow coming together. He is satisfied his authority was sufficient and his long experience of 47 years should certainly qualify him.

On the other hand defendant swears that Mr. Carson spoke roughly to him, used oaths, displayed handcuffs, and hinted that he had a pistol in his pocket. He swears also that, believing Mr. C. was trespassing, and his "paper" no good, he warned him to get off the place and in auctioneer style counted one—two—three, each time warning him off. On Mr. Carson trying to advance the blows were struck. Mr. Carson ran back, picked up a scantling, and advancing with this, other blows followed to be stopped by the irate father.

Mr. Clark claims his client was acting under his instructions in resisting, as Mr. Carson's authority was no authority on either occasion, and therefore the removal of the young man's goods was robbery and the parties accessory to it were liable to an action.

Mr. Clark made an exhaustive summing up putting the case for his client in very strong terms, but after hearing Mr. Telford's side of the case the mayor decided the evidence justified a committal and ruled so. Dr. Jamieson, Mrs. C. Cameron and Mr. Wm. Cameron all gave evidence. Bail was accepted \$500 on the young man's own recognizance, and \$500 by his father-in-law Mr. Wm. Wilder.

The case was a tedious one lasting from about 2 p. m. till after 11 o'clock.
