FRED HUNTER IN CHINA

A Raoyi Home Letter.

Cutting up Boxes—Work of the Allies—Opinions of the different Army Corps—Dine in palaces, Sleep in mud—Valuable Curios.

Our readers will peruse with great interest the following letter received from Lieut. Fred Hunter by his brother here, and kindly furnished for the Review at our request. The dash and the romance of this mixed up China affair just suits our young townsman, who is having a taste of the bitter and the sweet in connection with British military enterprise:

Tien Tsin October 4, 1900.

My Dear Mother and All—

Replying to your inquiries as to my health would say that I am feeling very fit, in excellent health in fact, and as hard as nails. Have not been ill now for a year or so. Please tell mother not to worry an instant about my health, which is excellent.

Yesterday I returned from the lines of communication from near Peking with 45 shoes to take part in a large expedition under Field Marshall Von Woldersee too "Pao Ting Fou" the capital of the Province of "Pe Chih" and formerly the capital of China. It is one of the oldest and richest cities in China and believed now to contain a large force of Boxers and Chinese Imperial troops. It lies one hundred miles S. W. of Peking and N. W. of Tien Tsin. The expedition starts from Tien Tsin and Peking simultaneously and will take six weeks. We expect definite orders hourly and start day after to-morrow. Do not expect any letters therefore for six weeks, but do not be alarmed.

While on the Lines of Communication I had an opportunity of cutting up a few Boxes and obtained a quantity of rifles, spears and swords. The country from half way between Tien Tsin to Peking is still infested by scattered bands of Boxers, robbers and Chinese troops. They are constantly cutting up single travellers and followers who stray a half mile or so from the Post. This makes it necessary to have large numbers of men on the Lines of Communication to protect the mails and traffic.

Orders have been issued to all troops to prepare winter quarters so at present there is a perpetual scramble for buildings of any kind.

30,000 Germans are said to have landed whilst the Russians who had been leaving China for Port Arthur for the winter are now ordered to remain in Tien Tsin.

A week ago the Germans and Russians attacked the "Re Tang Fork" near "Toka" and a large number were blown up by mines. The British and Australians, who hurried down in lighters and boats, arrived just too late.

A force left yesterday to proceed by sea to "Shan Hai Khwan" farther up the gulf of "Pi Chih" but news has just arrived that an officer of British Navy and 12 men had already taken the place with bitter opposition. Shan Hai Khwan is an important place, being the most Northern port in China which is open all winter and the terminus of the Manchurian Ry. and on the high road to Peking from the North. It is very lucky we forestalled the Russians in capturing it. It is also the headquarters of a large force of Imperial Chinese troops.

Last week the 3rd Cavalry and "B" Bat R. H. H. made a reconnaissance to two large cities 30 miles from Tien Tsin and extracted large ransoms from them. We play polo both in Peking and Tien Tsin now, whilst magnificent German bands play in the parks in the evening.

Last night we dined with the German Cavalry and right royally they entertained us. To-morrow I have an invitation to dine with German Artillery. A few days ago I dined with an Italian Regiment in "Matao" charming fellows they are too.

I am saving all my pay and have already shipped home to India to Herb Seyer a large box full of interesting and costly curios. I have a quantity of silver here now and a large number of mules bought from the Russians for a mere nothing, 50 cents in U. S. money. If I can only sell them I shall get \$50 each and have several hundred pounds to the good. Every day one has opportunities of getting more, but the trouble is to carry it away. I have seen the most beautiful China vases, cups saucers etc. used for any old purpose or wantonly broken. We dine often in palaces, often sleep in mud, but daily lose fortunes by not being able to carry them away.

When I return and come home I will be able to clothe you all in the most beautiful silks and present mother with the most costly silver tea sets, bewls, trays, bracelets, pearl jewelry

(I have a deal of it in the box sent to India) It is a box 4 X 4 X 3-4, jammed full, everything, oter and sable coats etc. etc. I am trying to sell all I get now and start a bank account. Many fellows who were at the relief of Peking are now fabulously wealthy, but wait till after "Pao Ting Fou" and perhaps I will have a bit too.

The Colonel just this minute has given away 52 ponies and mules we don't know what to do with them. We sold 50 for \$2000 the other day, all of which went to the men.

I hope you send me a military tur cap and fur gauntlets, black Persian Lamb. It is getting cold at nights here, just exactly the same climate as England. It is a grand country indeed. We have heard absolutely nothing about South Africa since the 15th of August and know nothing about what is going on either out or inside of China except in our own particular station. Large numbers of Troops of all nationalities keep coming in daily. The French are too despicable for words. I believe one German Brigade could wipe out the whole French Army. They are simply loathsome looking creatures and absolute cowards with no discipline.

We have had several dust storms and beastly things they are indeed.

You asked me my opinion of the different army corps. Well, I consider the Japs very fine little fellows, smart, brave and well handled. Germans are good, Russians dirty and cruel but fairly good troops. Austrians, splendid. Italians good, officers excellent. Americans, excellent, commissariat and transport men; good physique; officers perhaps inferior to Europeans in knowledge of war, discipline fair, but fighting qualities excellent, although they are badly handled. Naturally the British are best but their staff officers are something too bad for words, they are a disgrace. Australians very hardy, excellent material, have keen, but uneducated officers, they are volunteers purely.

Live Stock Market. Toronto.

Toronto, Dec 28—The receipts at the western cattle yards today amounted to 22 loads, including 1000 hogs, 120 sheep and lambs, 200 cattle, and a dozen calves.

There is no business of any account doing. Good export cattle is wanted, but it is not here, and the right kind of cattle would sell up to about 50 per lb. There is no demand for butcher cattle, as the local tradesmen have not yet exhausted their stock, and from present appearances scarcely anything is likely to be wanted until well into next week. Prices are normally unchanged.

A load of butcher cattle was purchased by Mr Collins, average 1,000 lbs, at 8 1/2c per lb, with ten dollars back.

21 cattle, average 900 lbs, were purchased by Mr Zeigman at 8 1/2c per lb.

These sales were the principal deals in cattle today, though, of course, some few odd lots changed hands.

Sheep and lambs are dull; there is no demand for sheep, but lambs are steady.

Calves and milch cows are unchanged. Stockers, feeders and bulls are not quotably changed; there is no enquiry.

A few light stockers were sold at 2 1/2 and 3c per lb.

Hogs are steady and unchanged. Hogs to fetch the top price must be of prime quality, and scale not below 160 nor above 200 lbs.
