McKinnon Leads in the County Contest.

### TOWN HALL BY-LAW DEFEATED.

Never was a more agreeable day for voters. Reasonably mild, good sleighing and lots of good candidates to choose from. The interest taken shows that the public are alive to their municipal interests and though some of the "good men" must be left at home, the closeness of the run in some instances leads to wariness in public life.

### DURHAM.

The contest for the mayoralty in Durham was of unusual interest, and has been a surprise to many. Quite unexpectedly and at the eleventh hour, Laidlaw appeared in the field, and the race between him and his old opponent, Calder appeared in the field, and the race between him and his old opponent, Laidlaw at once drew attention. That Calder has won being 3 days out of town during the week, is under the circumstances, very flattering to him, as it shows a municipal confidence in him as chief magistrate that few possess. Without doubt, Mr. Laidlaw's advocacy of the unpopular Town Hall by-law, cost him votes while Calder in turn was strengthened by the active advocacy he has given of late to the proposed new Cement industry, but over all this it must be conceded, is the deep-seated belief that Calder has few equals in municipal ability, and that his handling of town affairs in the past was both creditable to himself and profitable to the town.

Mr. Gorsline two years ago crept into the council with only 2 votes to spare: this year he jumps in near the head of the list being only 3 votes behind Livingstone who 2 years ago was at the top also, but with 66 above Gorsline. The men who receive such an endorsement have a great responsibility, and we have no doubt they will be worthy of their support, and that in company with Mr. Calder and the rest of the new council, there will be a harmonious working for the interests of the town in this first year of the new century.

The fate of the by-law was a foregone conclusion, not so much from the lack of appreciation of its necessity as from the undesirability of increasing town obligations at present, and not a little from the lack of details as to construction, site, &c with which it was launched.
