LETTER TO THE EDITOR.

SARGEEN PARK

Mr. Editor,

Dear Sir:—

Will you oblige me by inserting a short article on the above subject, viz., our Park, which has so long been in its wilderness state, a disgrace to the town and its inhabitants who have no where to go for a walk or for recreation and pleasure. Now during the past summer I often felt sorry for the young people as well as the boys and girls when they were trying to hold their picnics in it.

Having some experience in fitting up such grounds I took occasion to survey the whole park and make a rough estimate of the cost to make it something like presentable, both for pleasure and profit to the people of Durham.

In looking over it I see that nature has grandly endowed it with admirable qualities for nearly all kinds of amusement. In the first place there is a good sloping bank extending around three sides of it, forming a complete amphitheatre, for sight seers of the different games that may be going on, then there is ample room in the flat for a horse race track around the outside of the flat and inside of that a bicycle track and ball grounds for every imaginable game. On the other side of the flat nature has provided one of the best ferry ways from that there could be constructed, at little expense on account of the bend in the river, a beautiful bathing place nearly surrounded by ashrubbery of green bushes; in fact there is every facility for making it a real pleasure resort for both old and young.

Now it is a want that Durham has long felt; how often have we heard the remark, when a walk has been proposed. Where can we go? There is no where to go in this place.

But how is this thing to be done? I propose that the citizens, the council and the Company Co-operate and to gether bring this very lawdable thing about. Say that there ten citizens who would give fifty dollars a piece to be paid in five years, viz., ten dollars a year.

Again say the Council grant one hundred dollars a year for five years, for this work could not all be done at once, for we should have to wait for the rotting of some of the stumps and according to do it the cheapest way (my rough estimate) the park could be made very presentable in five years for the annual cost of \$200. The work that is proposed to be done. 1st, clearing; burning of all timber and rubbish. 2nd, levelling of all grounds in proper shape for the different purposes for which it is wanted including a carriage road, race track, bicycle track and ball grounds, one bridge over river and fixing of fernery and bathing pond as well as planting about 500 ornamental trees.

This of course would not make it a paradise, yet I am sure if the citizens of Durham saw it that far they would not grudge a little more to beautify it and put up proper buildings for each department.

Now Mr Editor I contend this thing could be done without any one feeling it and at the same time be a great pleasure to the citizens and perhaps in time a source of revenue.

Live Stock Market.

Toronto.
Business was brisk at the Western Cattle Market to-day, and although the run was large, everything was cleared up. Prices were good, particularly for the choicer grades, and there was a general tone of firmness in the market. The demand was good for nearly every class of cattle, the best animals selling quickly. Sheep and lambs were firmer, and hogs were steady.
EXPORT CATTLE.—Market was active and prices steady at \$4.50 to \$5 for choice and \$4.25 to 4.50 for light. The supply is not very large, as farmers have not finished fattening their cattle.
BUTCHERS CATTLE.—Large offerings of good to choice beasts met with a

steady demand and business was lively. The demand ran principally to the better grades, and all of the good butchers' realized high prices.

EXPORT BULLS.—The offerings were not so good and prices were easier for heavy cattle. They are quoted at \$4 to \$4.50. Light are unchanged at 3.25 to 3.75. A few lots sold at fair prices.

FEDERS.—Light are active and quoted a trifle higher to \$3 to \$3.50. The offerings were rather large to-day and all sold well.

STOCKERS.—There is a good inquiry for weights of 500 to 800 lbs, and prices are firmer at \$2.50 to \$3.25. Off-colors and heifers are dull at \$1.75 to \$2.25.

MILK COWS.—The easy feeling in the market continues and prices paid, even for the best, are only fair. One cow sold at \$48 and this was the limit. Sales were made as low as \$20.

SHEEP AND LAMBS.—The market for sheep has improved and trade is now in good condition. Prices are firmer. Export ewes are worth \$3 to \$3.25 and bucks 2.50 to \$3 per cwt, and butchers bring \$2.50 to \$3.50 each. Lambs are higher at \$3.50 to \$4.30 per cwt, and \$2.50 to \$4 each. Sales of fancy lots were made to-day at \$4.40 and \$4.50 per cwt, but the ordinary run of lambs did not nearly approach this standard, there is no change in calves. They are active and steady at \$2 to \$3 each.

HOGS.—No change. Offerings large and market firm at \$6 for selects and \$5.50 for lights and fats.
