THE CENSUS

The Globe a few days ago had an article on the coming Census, which is the first since Confederation to be taken by a Liberal government. We may rest assured, that with the thoroughness characteristic of the present administration, the census will be taken in a reliable trustworthy way. In previous counts of the population, the de jure system was followed, that is, all members of a family even though residing elsewhere are counted and thus no doubt much double counting occurs.

The other and British system is the de facto system by which the count is taken on a single night throughout the whole country, only those in the house being counted.

The day picked upon is Sunday March 31, at midnight, so if the young man's visit to his sweetheart extends into April 1st, he will be counted as one of the family for that occasion.

However, to make comparisons with the past censuses both systems are to be taken and thus the truth will be arrived at.

There will likely arise the old feeling of restraint giving information, but this is quite needless as no connection exists between census statistics and municipal assessment and taxation.

The figures in connection with the growth of trade and cognate matters, will certainly show large increases, but whether the population will reach 6,000,000 is doubtful.
