THE ROSS GOVERNMENT'S POLICY.

There are some links in the imperial chain that chafe a bit. Even Toronto, ultra loyalist Toronto, admits that. So loyal a gentleman and so brave a soldier as Denison, a foremost member of the British Empire League, has written a book in which he scores the War Office and the superciliousness of the British officers sent over here as S. O. C. This is one of the little roughnesses in the chain which causes some irritation. On examining the public utterances of our public men, it will be found that the Premier of Ontario has steered a very wise and prudent course between imperialism and the Canada-for-the-Canadians sentiment which exists as strongly in this Province as elsewhere. The Ross Government has kept in mind the necessities of the mother country in its nickel policy; now it proposes to reward with free grants of land our volunteers who fought for the Empire in South Africa. Ontario was being Great Britain in her emergency, and will continue to be. It has been a pleasure to demonstrate our dutiful affection. But beside this imperial feeling in Ontario, strong and true, there is also the feeling that Canada must hew out her own destiny, operating freely within certain lines. It is worth while to remark that this note of sturdy Canadianism also finds expression in Premier Ross's speeches. He has always in view the basic sentiment of Canadianism—democracy. Mr. Ross is the countryman of Burns, he who sang "A man's a man for a that. The rank is but the guinea stamp." The Premier has that couplet in his soul, and his imperialism must not be confused with anything that would accentuate caste distinctions. It was at a little dinner the other night that he approved of Mr. Chamberlain's plan of a consultative council for the Empire. It would be a good thing to meet in London and talk over the affairs of empire; it would promote esprit de corps; and might even influence imperial policy. As for Canadian representation at Westminster, is there really any need of it, when our House of Commons speaks with the authority of six million voices behind it? There is just the possibility, in a House of over six hundred members, that six colonial voices might not be heard very well.

Distribution of Samples of Seed Grain and Potatoes

During the past twelve years samples of those varieties of grain, &c., which have succeeded best on the several Experimental Farms have been distributed on application in 3-lb. bags, free through the mail, to farmers in all parts of the Dominion. The object in view in this distribution has been to add to the productivity and improve the quality of these important agricultural products throughout the country, by placing within reach of every farmer, pure seed of the most vigorous and productive sorts. This work has met with much appreciation, and a large measure of success.

Under instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution will be made this season. Owing to a very large number of applications annually received, it is not practicable to send more than one sample to each applicant,—hence if an individual receives a sample of oats, he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes, and applications for more than one sample for one household cannot be entertained. These samples will be sent only by those who apply personally, list of names from societies or individuals cannot be considered. The distribution will consist as heretofore of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley field peas, Indian corn and potatoes.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent any time before the 1st of March, 1901, after which date the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may all be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties writing will please mention the sort of sample they would prefer, naming two or three different varieties of their choice. Should the available stock of all the varieties named be exhausted, some other good sorts will be sent instead.

The samples of grain will be sent early but potatoes cannot be distributed until danger of injury in transit by frost is over. No provision has been made for any general distribution of any other seed than those named.

Robb—Walls—That Com McFadden be instructed to examine the validity of the Treasurer's surties in the Registry office Durham. Carried.

Walls—McIntyre—That Com McFadden be instructed to have the len-wood removed between lots 14-15, Con 2; provided it can be done for the material on the ground. Carried.

McFadden—Robb—That the Clerk receive tenders for printing marked "Tender" also applications for Assessor as next session of Council. Assessor's salary \$50 not including selection of Jurors. Carried. Resolved that the following accounts be paid:—J A Lambert, ballots \$4; Each D R D \$8.50; Clerk distributing ballots \$3; Registration fees, 91 births, 17 marriages and 48 deaths amt'g to \$91.20 according to the act.

Walls—McIntyre—That we now adjourn to meet on Saturday Feb 9th to receive the Auditors report, applications for Assessor, tenders for printing and general business.
