For years she has been the life and soul of many happy gatherings, and she was always among the first in good works and gentlededs. The New Year's gatherings and other functions of the Clan Gordon, will miss her kindly presence and winsome manner; and many will feel there has passed from their life a rare influence that cannot be replaced.

She was a lady of considerable culture and of deep religious experience.

#### REMINISCENCE OF A FAMOUS SPEECH.

In a recent issue, the Vancouver World revives an important address, made by the late Hon. George Brown, in Toronto, on Nov. 29, 1850. Perhaps some of our older residents remember the gathering, which took place in the city hall, and was one representative of all the leading Liberals in Western Ontario. Mr Brown's speech was chiefly remarkable for its strong declaration in favor of the Confederation of the Dominion, a question destined to be a burning one, but then little referred to. He said he would herald with delight the day when the great British North American provinces would rise in their might, and take their place among the nations of the world. Let us have, he concluded, a federation of our own, between Upper and Lower Canada, and then gradually take in those other provinces when the opportunity is offered. The position was adopted by the leaders on both sides of politics, and Confederation was accomplished on July 1, 1867—a union that has been fraught with good for the people of Canada, and bids fair, in the twentieth century, on which we have now entered, being still more fruitful of benefit to its steadily growing population. Mr Brown's advocacy of Confederation and of the acquiring of the Northwest Territories, ought never to be forgotten by the Canadian people.—Toronto Star.
