# S. G. FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

Rousing Meetings in Durham and Holstein.

As usual the meetings of the Farmers' Institute here aroused a wide interest, but not more than their aim and usefulness deserve. The farmers in larger numbers are coming to find out how practical are the discussions, how beneficial the ideas they hear from others who have, it may be, given a specialist's attention to some part of their work.

Happily the meetings are now completely divested of the partisan idea, which for some years lessened their usefulness, and are now fully valued by all intelligent farmers as important accessories to their business.

The valuable privileges in connection with the Institute such as qualified lecturers on various subjects, the bulletins issued to members, excursion privileges to the Model Farm, etc., both summer and winter, are coming to be more appreciated, and the good done is correspondingly great.

The speakers from a distance this time were Messrs Sherrington, Walkerton, and Mr Hallman, New Dundas, and the supplementary work by home men was also of a valuable character. Secy. Binnie and Pres. Morice have been efficient officials and much of the success of the meetings is due to their activity.

Mr Sherrington spoke on poultry matters and scouted the idea that it did not pay to prepare poultry for market. The right kind of birds always gives satisfaction his favorites being Brahma and Plymouth Rock. The Britishers preferred a white flesh and a milk diet was the best to produce this. Birds 4 or 5 months old should weigh 5 to 7 lbs and early marketing, say in Nov. or Dec. was desirable. A mixture of two parts each of oats, barley and peas or corn, he had found good feed. Another ration was on equal mixture of oats and buckwheat or boiled potatoes. After two weeks of this, add one oz. of beef suet to each 4 birds. A month of this and they are fit for market. Starve 4 hours before killing, dislocate the neck and bleed their pluck dry, then put in the shaping board and leave until animal heat is out of the birds.

One reason for low prices was the negligent way they were put on the market. He advised changing of cocks every year if possible.

Mr Hallman, on the "Water Supply of the Farm" was extremely interesting. An abundance of good water was a necessity for the stock raisers. He talked of the value of the hydraulic ram and the windmill as motive powers and of the importance of having water of proper temperature conveyed to the stables in basins or troughs. A tank of wood, steel or galvanized iron preferred.

Mr Hallman discussed the handling and breeding of dairy cattle from which the greatest revenue can be derived, not only from the products, butter and cheese, but from the enriching of the soil. He proceeded to give an outline of the requisites of success. The cow must be of the highest quality, the record of the sire, the dam and the great dam should be considered. Make a choice of breed and stand by it. Feed calves three times a day, 2 quarts each feed, of new milk; after 3 weeks grade off gradually to skim milk substituting oil cake or fat farming material up to 5 or 6 mos old; calves should be stabled in summer. The model cow should have strong digestive organs, and be kept supplied with nutritious food. Milk the young cow 12 months if possible, this fixing the lactation qualities. All cows should milk 10 months at least. The "triple wedge" shape was desired in a cow. In order to get this, feed the calf a coarse bulky food, nothing better than ensilage. Food should be boiled when fed mixed with milk. Better fed dry for mastication together with saliva, aids digestion. A cross between pure bred Holstein and Durham makes a good milking strain.

"Beautifying the Farm" was one of Mr Sherrington's subjects. He commented on the frequent barren appearance of fine houses without trees or shrubbery. Take the young people into confidence and encourage their interest. He advocated wire fences near buildings, have lawns sown in spring with some grain, red clover, blue grass, red top, 3 lbs of each. He advised hedges of our common red cedar pruning once in 2 years. Spruce, Austrian or Scotch pine trees were hardy and fine, and our own Maple or horse chestnut were not least. For backgrounds Norway Spruce was best and shrubs, set down promptly, such as gawdine effect, such as honey suckle, mock orange, golden glow, &c. Mr Geo Binnie gave an address on the

tion was different from all others. A Dr or a lawyer took his diploma and set to work on the people, a farmer's plans were often upset by wet weather and so on. The finest practical education in existence is now obtained at the O.A.C. and at these Farmers' Institutes, where practical men guide and lead the discussion. Many other advantages also accrue to members.

Mr Hallman on the "Home Dairy" quoted the amount exported to Britain, and advocated the use of the best cream separator by which all bad odors were eliminated from the milk. Warm and cold cream should not be mixed, neither should sweet and ripened cream. Warm salt before mixing and wash in the granulated stage and not in too cold water. Very important too to put up in tidy, attractive packages. A good article, neatly presented, will grow in favor.

THE EVENING MEETINGS.

These were as popular as ever, and were crowded to the door. In addition to the addresses already referred to, there were musical features most worthy. In Durham, Mayor Calder occupied the chair, and Misses Munro and Laidlaw, Messrs Telford and W Ramage very acceptably gave of their musical talents.

Mr Geo Binnie almost without notice and certainly without preparation gave, what many thought was the speech of the evening. The discussion on "Beautifying the Farm" led him to direct his remarks to the kindred subject of "Beautifying the Town." He pointed out the variety and adaptability nature had given Durham, no monotonous plain, but hills and winding river each in their own place giving opportunities for aesthetic improvement. The planting of trees on the street or by the river should be more diligently attended to. The heating of the Town Hall had made him wonder if it had become a government cold storage depot, while the change from 19th century electric light to 20th century Coal Oil (the lights went out) furnished a joke.

Mr Richardson, M. P., was prevented from attending on account of La Grippe. Dr. Jamieson was called away also.

The addresses at Durham and Holstein were practically on the same lines, so we have made no attempt to give both. Discussions followed each paper freely and much information was elicited.

The evening meeting at Holstein was presided over by Mr. Allan, Miss Mickelbore, presiding acceptably at the organ. Dr. Brown sang "To the Front," "The man behind the gun does the work" and other pieces. John Murdoch gave "The Old Home on the Farm" and for an encore "Tell them I've gone Tom." Wm. Ramage sang "Canada Forever" and "We are Britons still."

Supplementary meetings will be held at Aylton and Hanover on Feb. 7th and 8th respectively and will be addressed by Mr. McNeil, Walkerville and Miss Maddock, Guelph.
