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COUNTY COUNCIL.

Adjourned Out of Respect to her Late Majesty—Mr. Geo. Brown, Mayor. Elected Warden. Report of Business Transacted.

The new county council of Grey met for its first new century session at the court house on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The members were all present, viz.:—Division No. 1, Messrs Gordon and Doyle; No. 2, Messrs Pringle and Harness; No. 3, Messrs McKinnon and Reis; No. 4, Messrs Shenk and Allen; No. 5, Messrs Watson and McArthur; No. 6, Messrs Preston and McColman; No. 7, Messrs Brown and Agnew; No. 8, Messrs McDonald and Williseroft.

Simultaneously with the assembling of the council the news of the Queen's death was announced, and on motion of Mr. Jas. Allen it was resolved to adjourn until seven o'clock in the evening, and that the council chamber should be draped in mourning. This was done, and during the afternoon the large coat of arms and the warden's and clerk's desks were tastefully draped with the emblems of grief at the death of the Sovereign.

At seven o'clock the members met, when the clerk, Mr. J. Rutherford, took the chair and announced that the first business was the election of warden. The following nominations were then made:

Mr. Geo. A. Brown nominated by Mr. Gordon.
Mr. C. McKinnon, nominated by Mr. Reis.

Mr. Geo. Watson, nominated by Mr. Allen.

Mr. D. K. Preston, nominated by Mr. Harness.

Mr. N. McColman, nominated by Mr. McKinnon.

Each member who proposed a candidate then made a brief address on behalf of his nominee. Mr. McKinnon took advantage of the opportunity thus afforded him of thanking his proposer, but desired to withdraw his name. He referred to Mr. McColman's length of service in the council, 34 years, as entitling him to the warden's chair.

Voting was then proceeded with, and the result was as follows:

For Mr. Brown—Agnew, Brown, Doyle, Gordon, McColman—5.

For Mr. Watson—Allen, McArthur, Reis, Watson—4.

For Mr. Preston—Harness, McDonald, Preston, Pringle, Schenk, Williseroft—6.

For Mr. McColman—McKinnon—1.

Mr. McColman not being desirous of the office, as shown by his voting for Mr. Brown, was then dropped out and another vote taken in which Mr. McKinnon voted for Mr. Watson, tying him with Mr. Brown. Two more votes were then taken, the result being the same, five votes each for Messrs Brown and Watson and six for

Mr. Preston. Mr. Watson then did the graceful thing, which should be remembered to his credit and secured his election unanimously next year—he asked that his name be withdrawn, which was done, and another vote was then taken, which placed Mr. Brown in the Warden's chair, the vote being as follows:

For Mr. Brown—Agnew, Allen, Brown, Doyle, Gordon, McColman, McKinnon, Reis, Watson—9.

For Mr. Preston—Harness, McArthur, McDonald, Preston, Pringle, Schenk, Williseroft—7.

On motion of Messrs Preston and Agnew the vote was made unanimous, and the Warden elect was escorted to the chair by his proposer, Mr. Gordon and ex-Warden McDonald, and introduced in due form to the duty of the council for the year 1901.

After a committee had been appointed with Mr. Allen as chairman, to strike standing committees for the current year, the council adjourned until Wednesday at 10 a. m.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON.

Some of the members were late in getting in, but all were present by about 10.80—Warden Brown in the chair. Mr. F. H. Rutherford acted as messenger of the council, assisting the clerk.

Among the communications presented perhaps the most important was the claim of Arnold Bros of Acton for \$92.40 damages in connection with a horse which had been injured through what was claimed to be a defect on the roadway on town-line between Bentinck and Sullivan. This claim was made before and presented at the last meeting of the county council, and Mr. H. Brigham, late commissioner for Bentinck, was appointed to investigate the matter further and report. In this report he stated that he believed the Arnold Bros had a legal claim. Mr. Brigham thought the horse was worth about \$80, and that the claim could be settled for \$25. Claimant's lawyer, C. J. Mickle, of Casley, has issued a writ against the county for \$97.40, and only delays action to see what the county will do in the matter. It was referred to the Road and Bridge committee.

A communication was read from the council of Dufferin asking co-operation in memorializing the Legislature to abolish grand juries, or at least to enact that they shall not be called until a few days of court sittings, when it would be seen whether their services would be required.

Applications for the position of county auditor were received from H. W. Jenkins, Owen Sound; R. H. Fortune, Ayrton; and J. A. Swanston, Yeovil P. O.

A communication was also read from G. H. Ayleworth, secretary of the Association of Public and High School Trustees, asking the county council to elect a delegate to attend the convention at Toronto in April, and thus assist in strengthening the Association in the interests of rural schools, etc.

A statement was read from Mr. Horder, manager of the merchants Bank, of amounts to the credit of the county in that institution.

Mr. A. Grier, inspector of public schools for East Grey, reported concerning work done at Meaford model school.

The Prisoners' Aid Association, through Dr. A. M. Rosbrough, secretary, made application for the annual grant.

A petition from John Tophan and others asked that a bridge be built over the Grand River on the county line of Dufferin. A sketch of the district showed where the bridge was desired.

A form of memorial had also been received by clerk Rutherford, without anything to show with whom it originated, asking that statute labor be done away with; also to secure uniformity in the width of roadways and make provision for clearing away snow drifts, etc.

Among the accounts presented were a number of electric accounts from returning officers; and from J. H. Little, McCallum & Pratt, Geo Rankin, T. H. Blacklock, of the Dundalk Herald, for printing minutes; B. Breckenridge & Sons for funeral of Patrick Ryan, R. P. Butchart & Bro. J. H. Rutherford, and many others.

When the correspondences had been gone through the warden called for the report of the committee to strike standing committees for the year. Mr. Allen, chairman, presented his report; after which the members of such committees as they were called off retired to an ante-room and selected their chairman. Following is the slate of committees the first name in each being that of the chairman thereof:

Finance—Messrs Preston, McColman, Schenk, Allen, McDonald, Agnew, Williseroft, Watson, McArthur, Harness, Pringle, Reis, McKinnon, Gordon, Doyle.

County Property—Messrs Gordon, McDonald, Allen, Harness, McKinnon, McArthur, Pringle.

Education—Messrs Watson, Reis, Allen, Agnew, Doyle, McDonald, McColman, Pringle.

Printing and Stationery—Messrs Schenk, Williseroft, Reis, Agnew, Doyle, McArthur.

Communications and memorials—Messrs McColman, Harness, Gordon, McDonald, Allen, Watson.

Warden's Committee—Messrs Gordon and McDonald.

On motion of Messrs McDonald and McArthur, the mover and Messrs Gordon and Agnew were appointed a committee to draft an address of condolence on behalf of the county touching the death of our beloved Sovereign, Queen Victoria, and submit the same to the council during the present session.

In speaking briefly to the motion Mr. McDonald said no doubt resolutions of this kind would be passed by almost every representative body in the empire, and he believed it was a proper way in which to manifest appreciation of the loss incurred by the death of the sovereign. The motion was carried unanimously.

By-law 593 to appoint county auditors 594 to appoint a high school trustee for Meaford, and 595 to appoint a trustee for the Collegiate Institute, received their first and second readings, after which the council adjourned until Thursday at 10 a. m.
