THE BIG CONCERT.

Ben Nevis Camp, Sons of Scotland, scored another success on Friday evening last with their Annual Burns Anniversary Concert. The management, aiming to secure for Durham, the very best talent went to considerable expense to secure Miss Jessie Niven MacLachlan, the Scottish Prima donna, just lately from Scotland, and considering the limitations of the Town Hall and the expense incurred made the admission 50c. Many no doubt looked upon this as excessive, but the Hall was filled, there was no crowding, and though the object was not to make money, a small balance was left after expenses were paid, the proceeds amounting to \$150.  
 Opinions of Miss MacLachlan vary. She has a little too much professionalism, absent we are told in her gaelic pieces, but no one could but admire her voice whose power and richness were remarkable, and whose tenderness was shown in the Cradle Song "Can ye sew Cushions." "Rule Britannia" we thought her best, and she sung it right, using "rule" instead of the weaker word "rules" often heard in the line "Britannia rule the waves." The loss of her head in this and in "Wi a hundred pipers" was an inspiration in itself. She was liberal in her gaelic numbers and though but few there could understand they admired the music and enunciation, and drew their pleasure from looking on the faces of Commissioner John McArthur, Don. Graham, Don. McMillan, Neil McKinnon, and others whose warm Highland hearts were thrilled listening to the best gaelic singer in the world, and who would go 10 miles to hear her again.  
 Mr. Buchanan, her husband, gave two piano solos, and accompanied for the excellence of his music.  
 Mr. Jas. Fax was as popular as ever. He is without a peer as a humorist, and is continually adding to his store of humor, and without him the program would have decidedly lacked in Spice.  
 Piper Murray's first appearance here was a great success, both on the pipes and as a dancer. He will be welcomed back again.

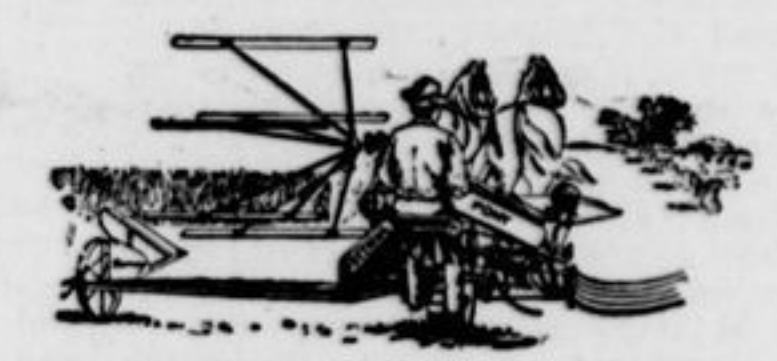
