EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met Feb. 9th, minutes confirmed.
 A petition was presented and asking that we do not hand over our Tp. roads to be controlled by the County—Resolved that no change take place and the rosys and clerks sign and petition to that effect and forward to our members. Carried.
 The reeve presented the following report—meeting of committee to settle statute labor and gravel acts, with Arthur Tp., and as follows: that after examining carefully the auditors' reports and road lists we find that up to this date, the Tp. of Egremont is indebted to the Tp. of Arthur in the sum of \$3.38. Signed R. McQueen, Reeve of Arthur, D. McQueen, Reeve of Egremont and D. Allan, Clerk of Egremont.
 McIntyre—Walls—That foregoing report be adopted and the reeve and clerk receive \$1.50 each for their services. Carried.
 Walls—McFadden—In the matter of transferring lots into other road beds asked by Jos Moyers and others he laid over till next meeting of council and that all interested parties are requested to attend and state their grievance. Carried.
 Robb—Walls—That the petition of Jas. Allan, and others soliciting aid for Nelson Widder be received and that he receive \$2 per week till next council meeting and that the same be placed in Jas Allan's hands—orders given for \$3. Carried.
 Councilor McFadden reports that the treasurer's surties were satisfactory.
 McIntyre—Robb—That councilor McFadden's report be adopted and that he be refunded \$1 cost of search. Carried.
 Mr. Dalgleish, Mt. Forest, requested the privilege of putting up mile posts along the leading roads in this municipality.
 Walls—Robb—That foregoing report be laid over for the present. Carried.
 McIntyre—McFadden—That after hearing the explanation given by the clerks confirmed by some of the printing houses, we distribute the printing as uniformly as possible between the towns of Durham, and Mt. Forest. Carried.
 McIntyre—McFadden—That By-law No. 137, 138, 139 and 140 with other information, as prepared by the clerk, be confirmed and signed by the reeve and clerk and the corporate seal be attached thereto. Carried.
 Walls—McFadden—That we have 300 copies of the foregoing By-laws &c., printed at the "Rep." office Mt. Forest. Carried.
 Robb—McIntyre—That the clerk receive the sum of \$15 for preparing said By-laws &c. Carried.
 McIntyre—Robb—That By-law 135 to appoint an assessor be now read a first and second time. Carried.
 Robb—McFadden—That we go into committee of the whole, to appoint an assessor, with the reeve in the chair. Carried.
 Committee rose and reported: council resumed and resolved that By-law 135 be filled in with the name of Walter Hastie, as assessor and be read a third time, signed sealed and ingressed on the By-law book.
 Robb—McFadden—That \$1 be paid Com'r. McIntyre out of the \$5.25 refund to this municipality from county on bridge on Glenelg townline. Carried.
 Walls—Robb—That auditors' report as read be received and adopted and that they receive \$8 each for their services. Carried.
 McIntyre—Walls—That C Ramage be awarded the printing of 300 copies of auditors' report. Carried.
 McIntyre—McFadden—That the clerk be instructed to write to manufacturers of road scrapers and receive price lists and report at next meeting. Carried.
 Walls—McIntyre—That the Municipality be divided for road improvements under the supervision of the Commissioner according to the following divisions.
 Division No 1, Mr. McQueen, Com'r. comprising con's 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10

from, and including the 5th sideroad to Proton townline inclusive.
 Division No 2, Mr. Robb, com'r. comprising cons 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 from and including the 5th sideroad to Proton townline inclusive.
 Division No 3, Mr. McIntyre, com'r. comprising cons 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22 Glenelg townline, from and including 5th sideroad to Proton townline inclusive.
 Division No 4, Mr. Walls com'r. comprising old survey from Arthur townline to Dudd's sideroad and east to 5th sideroad including Dudd's sideroad from O. S. R. to base line.
 Division No 5, Mr. McFadden, com'r. comprising Old Survey from Dudd's sideroad to Glenelg townline, east to 5th sideroad and 14th con from base line to 5th sideroad. Carried.
 Resolved that the following acts be paid:
 Municipal World, Assessors supplies, &c \$12.95; W Irwin, Financial Statements \$6.15; A Mitchell, express charges 50 cts W T Petrie, use of Hall, Nomination \$3.
 McIntyre—McFadden—That we now adjourn to meet again on Monday, March 25th to appoint pathmasters and general business. Carried.

"FOR GOD'S SAKE GET ME A PLACE TO DIE IN."

These words were uttered a few weeks ago by a poor fellow as he lay on his death-bed in a hotel at Gravenhurst. A week before he had travelled a whole day to reach the Sanatorium, but on but on medical examination it was found that the disease (consumption) was too far advanced to admit him. He tried to get board in Gravenhurst and finally, after repeated failures, secured admission to one of the hotels. He soon became worse and the resident physician of the Sanatorium was called in. When it became known that he had consumption, it was found impossible to get attendants to wait on him through fear of contagion. The hostler of the hotel was asked to help and on his refusal he was offered \$1.00 a day extra, but preferred to give up his position rather than expose himself, as he thought, to the danger of infection from the patient. The physician from the Sanatorium had to perform the duties of nurse and maid as well as his own. When the poor fellow found that the management of the hotel wished to get him out he begged the doctor for God's sake to get him a place to die in. The doctor looked after him for some days, remaining with him on his last visit until one o'clock in the morning. The poor sufferer was found dead next day in his bed and beyond the need of further help. Telegrams had been sent to his friends, and his sister, a fine young woman, reached Gravenhurst only in time to take away the dead body of her brother.
 Various proposals have been made to erect suitable structures to commemorate our late beloved Queen. When her Diamond Jubilee was celebrated four years ago large hospital undertakings were begun in London and elsewhere with her special sanction as the best expression of the nation's congratulations. To make it universal, shilling contributions were called for.
 The National Sanitarium Association has now provided a place in Gravenhurst for patients who are able to pay, and this has proved its usefulness by saving hundreds of lives since it was opened three years ago. A free hospital for poor patients who cannot pay and who are in the early stages of the disease is now in process of erection near the Sanatorium.
VICTORIA HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTION.
 To round up this work the National Sanitarium Association desires to build another hospital, near Toronto, for incurable consumptives. What better memorial could be erected than a "Victoria hospital" for such cases? All the large cities, of course, will have their statue of the Queen, but this will not be a national undertaking.
 We can, however, have the "Victoria Hospital" under the auspices of the National Sanitarium Association, and this might be built by contributions from all over Canada. Every village and town could send to it consumptive patients and thus benefit by a memorial to the Queen, to which they have contributed.
 Humanity demands that something should be done; self-protection against the danger of contagion demands that something be done; but the very doing of this by exciting dread of the disease makes it more difficult for its hopeless victims to receive the attention necessary to enable them to die in peace.
 "For God's sake, get me a place to die, is a call that should be no longer left unanswered. Your dollar will help to answer it.
 Contributions are already coming in for this much-needed undertaking.

Live Stock Market.

Toronto.
 Exporters were a trifle firmer for the best, and butchers' were steady. Export bulls were firmer and other bulls quiet and steady. Feeders were dull, and stockers were unchanged. Milch cows were dull and sheep and lambs were steady. Calves were quiet and hogs were unchanged. The total run was 63 loads including about 1,199 cattle, 661 sheep and lambs, 20 calves and 512 hogs.
 Export Cattle—The demand for choice lots was steady and prices ruled higher than those paid yesterday. One load of fine cattle sold at \$3.12 and another load at \$5. The bulk of the offerings, however brought \$4.75 to \$4.9c.
 Butchers' Cattle—There was only a moderate demand, but the receipts, especially of medium and inferior cattle, were large. Some choice lots sold at \$4 to \$4.15 and a couple of bunches brought higher figures. The demand for good stock is incessant and the scale of prices is likely to remain steady for some weeks.
 Export Bulls—Choice bulls sold 25c higher at \$3.75 to \$4.50. The offerings were not large and there was a good demand for fine bulls. Light are rather quiet at \$3 to \$3.75.
 Feeders and Stockers—Offerings were small and trade was quiet. Prices are steady and unchanged.
 Feeding Bulls—Offerings small and trade inactive. Prices were steady at \$2.50 to \$3.25.
 Milch Cows—The offerings were on the whole, a poor lot, and was dull. There was a steady inquiry for choice cows and they would sell at \$50 and over. To-day's offerings, however, were far from that standard of quality.
 Sheep and Lambs—Prices are steady and unchanged. The run was somewhat larger and trade was brisk at the opening. The demand fell away, however, before the close of the day's business, and some weakness was apparent. Everything was well cleaned up, but larger offerings would have broken prices a little.
 Calves—Trade quiet, with prices unchanged at \$2 to \$10 each.
 Hogs—No change. The run was small and the market was steady.
