

Rev. Mr. Jansen Speaks.

A recent issue of the Hamilton Times left with us, has the following report of an address by Rev. Mr. Jansen: "The paper of the day was read by Rev. A. G. Jansen, his subject being 'Christianity and War.' Mr. Jansen pointed out the contrast between Christianity and war, the one being heaven, the other hell. Christianity says, 'Peace on earth, good will to men.' The teaching of its founder justifies His royal title of 'Prince of Peace,' as He taught that the members of His kingdom should live in peace with one another. Wrongs and differences between nations should be settled by arbitration or international courts. As civilized nations we claim to be a brotherhood of men, and should act as becomes a brotherhood. The position of the Society of Friends was stated, which was that the Spirit of Jesus would one day redeem the world from war. How would England fare, it may be asked, if she put up the sword? Her moral influence would immeasurably increase. In China it is aggressive covetousness, backed up by arms in Christian hands, that has brought about the condition of things there. Some hold that the missionaries have not been blameless, by their omission if not by commission. If the missionary said, I am a Christian and therefore I cannot fight, they would not have been regarded by the Chinese as the fore-runners of the gunboat and the soldier. After all we are only half-Christian, and we have so disturbed the relations between man and man as to create suspicion and hatred of the representatives of Christianity. If the interdependence of nations were only realized, war would be looked upon as the right hand attacking the left. Canon Farrar's apparent justification of war was criticized by the essayist. The difficulty of arriving at a decision as to the justice of modern wars was discussed. We receive our ideas, he said, on this, as on many other subjects, largely from the newspapers, and as the journalists take different views, so we according to our reading take one side or the other. The theory and practice of the church differs on this, as on many other subjects, but if asked to invoke a blessing upon any conflict we should refuse to mix God and His religion with any devil's work. War as it appears to the actual combatants was spoken of, and its brutalizing effects upon all concerned in it were pointed out. The moral degeneracy which it produces is appalling. The cruel Chinese have doubtless committed devilish deeds, but if the actions attributed to the Christian allies by reliable authority are to be credited, then the heathen Chinese are not so far behind the so-called Christian nations. How long before the end of all un-Christian war? When there will be no longer an Alexander who longs for the conquest of the world; when Christians drink in more fully the spirit of their Master; when Christ the Prince of Peace shall come and claim the kingdoms of this world for His own.

DIED IN VAUGHAN.

Miss McLean was a half sister to the late Hector McLean, of south east Glenelg and cousin to Mr. Donald McDonald, teacher.
