ANOTHER OLD DURHAMITE.—Word came to Durham last week that Mrs. Cole, (mother of Albert Petty,) died in Hamilton on Feb. 14th, last at the age of 79 years. She was for many years a resident here, and was well known and highly respected.

DIED IN DURHAM.—On Monday last Mrs. Walter Tucker after weeks of suffering and ups and downs of hope, passed over to the greater number, aged 77. She was a sister to Mr. Duncan McKenzie, whose family, has, of late been frequently called upon to mourn.

Mrs. Kenneth McKenzie, of Glenora, died on Thursday last at the age of 72 years. For 20 years she has been bedridden as the result of paralysis, and the death of her daughter Mrs. Park very lately had a depressing effect upon her. She was buried at Rocky Saugeen cemetery on Saturday last the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Graham. The funeral was large and representative.

A PIONEER.—Mr. Samuel T. Rowe is one of the first pioneers of the County of Bruce, and father of Paisley. He was born in the city of Truro, County of Cornwall, England, March 9th, 1810. Came to New York 1830, to Toronto in 1841, to the County of Grey in 1842. Settled on farm lot 1, Conces, 1, of Normanby. First settler on Owen Sound road Gov. grant in 1842, thence to the County of Bruce in 1851. Mr. Rowe has always enjoyed good health. He has lived in the reign of five British Sovereigns, King George III, died 1820, then came George IV, William IV, Victoria and Edward VII. Mr. Rowe is enjoying good health, meets old friends in his rambles who say he looks as well as when they last saw him twenty years ago. He is only a little gray and is in the enjoyment of all his faculties. He is as jolly as ever and does all his correspondence, not a little, without the use of glasses.—Bruce Herald.

FROM RAINY RIVER.—We cull a few sentences from a letter received recently from Mr. R. Watson, who is prospering in the new country. Times are good, axemen getting \$2 a day, man and team \$65 a month and found, even to horseshoeing. Oats are 70c, Hay \$25 per ton, at Mine Centre \$40, Eggs per dozen 50 cts, Butter 30 cts a lb. Mr. Watson occupies the reeve's chair in the municipality of Alberton. His opponent was Mr. T. Whitmore, formerly of Egremont, who got 22 votes to Mr. Watson's 23, so that both S. Grey men have their friends well divided. Mr. Watson captured a fine moose calf last summer and now at 7 mos. stands 13 hands. He may, if he can break it to harness, let the horse men of S. Grey see where trotting sprang from, at one of our fall shows. The following extracts give us a whiff of New Ontario: We are having a beautiful winter here. In fact all the years we have passed here, the winter is what we boast of. Wealthy people south and east should make Rainy River Valley a winter resort. The aspen leaf is hanging dry and not unless for weeks at a time. A snow drift is never seen here, a blustering day is quite unknown. We are out of the wind belt. Our railroad construction work is in full swing, to be completed by next fall, competing with C. P. R. for Eastward movement of the West crop of coming season. So say McKenzie and Mann and it looks like it too. Near Ft. Francis will be a bridge 2 1/2 or 3 miles long, over an arm of Rhiny Lake. Are you up in bridge lore? I am told it will be the longest bridge in America, or perhaps the world. We look for an influx of settlers when R. R. is running. Our route from Port Arthur to Winnipeg should be a favorite with tourists and others as it will break the monotony of the long dreary ride through rocky, bleak, barren, desolation.
