That hot and high section of our great dominion has become the scene of much experimentation owing to the important part which climate has played in all recent theories of tuberculosis cure. The United States Government a few years ago set apart a former military reservation In New Mexico for the use of the Marine Hospital Service in the treatment of consumptive sailors. It was affirmed by the Surgeon General that on the vast plateau men who had still some chance of cure might recover as an effect of mere change of climate. The establishment of sanitaria there has induced many persons who are not associated with the Marine Hospital Service to try the climate of New Mexico, and, therefore, the opportunities for experiments by local medical men have become exceptional. Among the most intelligent students of tuberculosis are the biologists of the University of New Mexico. One of these, Professor Weinzori, has announced that complete cures in cases of consumption have been achieved solely by changes of altitude-that by mov-
