In the early morning of Sabbath the 24th, Feb. Mrs James Hastie passed away. She was one of the early settlers near Dromore, having come to Egremont in 1866. She was born at Lochhead, near Moffat, Dumfrireshire, Scotland, in 1829, so had passed her threescore and ten years. She spent her maiden years in North Dumfries, out on her father's farm, in company with six sisters and one brother, all of whom survive her. Over 50 yrs ago she married James Hastie who survives her, as do her grown up family of four sons and three daughters. Mrs S. Kin-nel, Proton, Mrs R. Kenwick Dromore, Mrs G. Cushnie Mr Forest, Her sons, William, Egerton, in Proton, Walter, on the homestead, John, Knox College Toronto, and James in Rainy River, Dist. who could not be here. Mrs Hastie was of a quiet thoughtful disposition much given to reading and contemplation. Early she began to instruct her children about subjects that few mothers think of, and all while the work of the home went on. The home was her Kingdom in which her family recognized her as the Queen, and queenly qualities she possessed. She was inducted with the strongly marked qualities of a Scottish gentle woman, which any of those who knew her well were privileged to know the value of. She was never heard by any one to say an unkindly word of a neighbor, and all knew her willingness to help, in time of trouble. Thus her life was one of beauty and an example of Christian work. She was quietly laid to rest by her three sons and three sons-in-law in the church yard connected with Amos church, of which she had been a true member since its inception. Relations and friends gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one who was much loved by all.

It will be well remembered by many of the readers of the Review that on 11th of April last 1900, Mr and Mrs Hastie celebrated their golden wedding, and at that time Mrs Hastie was in good health with many years before her, but death has come, that unexpected visitor and taken her from us.
